SENTENCE ON AMERICANS.

Further Particulars of Charges Against Officers of the Cruisers Chicago.

Rome. April 29.-The arrest and ser tencing of the three officers and a marine of the United States cruiser Chicago on the charge of disorderly conduct, continue to Meyer, who was absent from Rome, hurciedly returned to this city in an endeavor to reach some arrangement with the Italian authorities. 
