SNOWBALL'S MILL IS BREAKING ALL RECORDS

Has Averaged 160,000 Feet Per Day in the Past Two Weeks—Shives' Mill also Doing Well.

CHATHAM, July 18.—The Snowball Company's big mill has been making some records in the way of cutting during the last two weeks that have probably not been equalled by any other firm in the province. Working ten hours per day with three gangs sawing the mill turned out the total of 210,750 superficial feet, from July 2 to July 7, 51,513 superficial feet, and from July 2 to July 14, 94,237 feet, a total for twelve days of 1,553,419 feet. This makes an average daily cut of 129,451 feet and is not surpassed by any mill in the province. The nearest approach being Shives' mill on the Hesloche, which is credited with 140,000 daily.

A record for a single day's cut was made on June 28th, when the Snowball's mill turned out the total of 210,750 superficial feet, George Groat, millwright for the Snowball Company, has received much commendation for the work done under his supervision.

The fact that Chatham has had a spell of warm weather which sent the thermometer up in the nineties makes the record even more noteworthy.

ONTARIO FARMERS TOO BUSY AND BY-ELECTIONS IS POSTPONED.

TORONTO, July 18.—Up in Cardwell the farmers are too busy in the political arena to go into politics now, and the political leaders there have signified their disapproval of August 6 as by-election date. Therefore the provincial government have agreed that the date be fixed for the autumn.

BIDDEFORD, Me., July 18.—Deputy sheriff from Portland, Me., assisted by York county officers have been searching in this vicinity today for George Huston, the prisoner who escaped from the jail in Portland yesterday. It is believed that the prisoner is hiding in the woods somewhere along the railroad line between this city and North Berwick.

RETIRED ON \$5,000 A YEAR.

TORONTO, July 18.—The governors of Toronto University met today and fixed President London's retiring allowance at \$5,000 a year, equal to full pay.

The sub-committee appointed to look into the question of the new warehouse for the Clark wharf met yesterday morning. The matter will come up at the next meeting of the board of works and if by that time the board are of the opinion that the dredging will be done in time to allow the crib to be put down, tenders will then be called for the warehouse. The committee will recommend that the warehouse be built of wood, instead of steel, as suggested by Ald. McGoldrick, the latter construction being found to be too costly. The question of the doors to the warehouse has not yet been decided upon. Engineer Peters calculated that steel rolling doors would cost in the vicinity of \$10,000. The committee intend to look into a new kind of three rolling doors which are being used on the L. C. R.

A meeting of the water and sewerage board has been called for this afternoon at 3:30. A matter which will probably be settled is the making of an agreement with Mrs. Sterling Barker to prevent the sewage from the Barker Hotel entering into Loch Lomond. Mrs. Barker lately met a committee of the board and the matter will probably be settled by the erection of a cesspool for the hotel.
