LIVELY DISCUSSION OVER TRAMWAY BILL

Moncton and Shediac Protest Against the
Charter—Will be Passed With
Amendments.

FREDRICKTON, N. B., April 2. — The corporations committee this morning recommended a bill to enable Trinity church, of St. John, to issue debentures to the amount of \$50,000 to retire maturing debentures. The St. John Y. M. C. A. is authorizing them to make temporary loan to meet expenditures on their new building without mortgaging the same, and upon the security of the board of directors, the corporation recommended.

Lengthy discussion took place over the provisions of the Moncton Street Railway bill. Several conflicting interests were represented and heard. The promoters of the bill said it was only a revival of their former charter with an added provision to extend the operations of company into adjoining towns and throughout the country. Authority was also asked to acquire water powers by expropriation if necessary to generate electricity. Representatives of the city council objected to the tramway company being privileged to furnish electric heat and power and therein compete with the city. Mayor McDonald of Shediac took strong ground against the company being granted exclusive powers in the municipality and the company's representatives consented to that section being struck out. The committee considered the bill in private and agreed to recommend it with amendments to be mutually agreed upon by respective parties.

Harriman's Tip to
Government

RETURNS HOME

Vastly Changed Sentiment in
West Toward Railways,

He Says

NEW YORK, April 1.—Browned by weeks under southern skies and brimmed over with vitality and geniality, E. H. Harriman reached this city late today to all appearances a rejuvenated man after his long vacation and business trip over the network of Harriman railroads in the west, the southwest and Mexico. "I'm all right now," was his terse rejoinder to a question as to the state of his health, and added that the trip was too much work to do to think of retirement.

Mr. Harriman preferred to dwell upon the improvements which he saw in progress and recently completed along the lines of the Southern Pacific during his travels. About the Mexican west coast extensions of the Southern Pacific he was particularly enthusiastic.

When he finally reached a discussion of governmental affairs, Mr. Harriman, if less explicit than in some recent statements, had positive opinions to offer as to general lines of policy.

"Less red tape and more work," was the motto he recommended as precept in governmental circles. "Elasticity in expenditure, making the outgo at the income; these are the principles that ought to rule in governmental as in private business. Of course the government has got to be maintained in a dignified and liberal way," he declared, "but the results achieved should be commensurate with the appropriations. I think the difficulty of securing continuity in government work, uncertain year to year appropriations preventing anything like constant planning, head in many instances. But there could be improvement over present methods."

Speaking for the Philippines and voicing their sentiments, Mr. Ocampo Delon pleaded for such independence.

KING LEOPOLD OFFERS PRIZE FOR ESSAY

\$5,000 for Best Article on Aerial Navigation and Means of Encouraging It.

NEW YORK, April 2.—King Leopold of Belgium has decided to grant a prize of \$5,000 to the author of the best work answering the following question: "Describe the progress of aerial navigation and the best means to encourage it."

All essays or works competing for the prize must be sent to the Minister of Science and Arts in Brussels before March 31, 1911. The competition is open to all nationalities. The jury will comprise three Belgians and four foreign members.

Competitors may use any of these languages: French, English, Flemish, German, Italian, Spanish or Portuguese.

THE EMPRESS LANDED 1430 PASSENGERS

Docked at West Side at
Eleven O'clock

Sailed This Morning—Other
Vessels Moving.

The C. P. R. royal mail steamer Empress, under Capt. J. V. Foster, arrived in port this morning at 10:30 o'clock from Liverpool via Halifax and docked at No. 2 wharf. The big liner left Liverpool March 26th and had an uneventful voyage. Coming across the Atlantic the weather was fine and no ice was sighted. The Empress reached Halifax on Thursday evening at 7 o'clock and landed fifty passengers and a heavy mail, consisting of 1,381 bags and 338 packages. She left Halifax for here at 8 o'clock. SLAY COUPLE, BURN HOUSE

TOLEDO, Ohio, April 1.—In finding bodies of Ludwig Krueger, aged 66, and his wife, aged 63, buried in the cellar of their home, which was destroyed by fire early today, the Toledo police are confronted by a puzzling murder mystery.

At three o'clock this morning the Krueger residence, one mile west of Toledo, was discovered ablaze and there was no trace of the Kruegers. When the ashes had cooled a search of the debris was made, but there was no evidence of the aged couple having been burned to death.

Later in the day two boys were digging in the cellar and noticed that the brick floor had been tampered with. One of them raised a brick and the face of the dead woman was revealed. More of the floor was taken up and the dead body of Mr. Krueger was found buried with his head at the feet of his wife. Both had been stabbed to death, presumably by a butcher knife. It is not known when the murder occurred, as the Kruegers were last seen alive on Tuesday evening by M. Soboleski, a tailor, who last Saturday paid Mr. Krueger \$2.00 as part payment for the purchase of a suit. It is believed that robbery was the motive and that the slayer, after burying the bodies and replacing the brick flooring in the cellar, set fire to the house to hide the murder.

in Parliament

USE THEIR FISTS, TOO

LONDON, April 1.—Militant suffragettes made another attempt to raid the house of commons in a search for Premier Asquith this afternoon, but were quickly scattered by mounted police.

A deputation of twenty-seven representatives of the largest cities of England marched out from Caxton Hall and made their way in the direction of Westminster. The procession was headed by a band playing the Marseillaise.

The premier already made known his refusal to see the deputation, and the police, breasting the women, were in Parliament Square in large force.
