CANDIDATES HEARD IN GLOUCESTER

Standard Bearer in Oct. 29 By-Election Continue Campaign

M. D. COORMIER AMONG SPEAKERS

Bathurst, Oct. 12. - The Government forces, supporting the candidature of Dr. W. H. Coffyn, of Bathurst, in the Gloucester by-election on October 29, shifted their political camp to the lower end of the county and meetings were addressed to night at Melville and St. Leon by Dr. Coffyn, A. J. Doucett, A. M. Robichaud and J. L. Ryan. Meetings in the interest of the Opposition candidate, F. T. B. Young, of Carleton Place, were held tonight at North Teagouche and Lower Bedford, addressed by Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, C. T. Richard, M.L.A., H. C. Ramsey and G. T. Feeny and at Ste. Rose and Gasperau by Mr. Young, J. A. Doucett, M.L.A., John Robichaud and S. R. Leger, M.L.A.

The Government meeting, held at Pettit Rocher last night was addressed by A. J. Doucett, A. M. Robichaud, Dr. Coffyn, J. L. Ryan, Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, Hon. A. J. Leger, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, and Max D. Cormier, M.P. for Restigouche-Madawaska. Others on the platform were H. Colby Smith, M.L.A., Saint John, and A. P. N. McLaughlin, Campbellton.

TO DISPOSE OF GAME SEIZURES AMONG NEEDY

Department of Lands and Mines Instructs Officers to Deliver to Charitable Institutions whenever Possible - Poor Commissioners and Clergy to be Consulted in Rural Districts.

Fredericton, N. B., October 12. - The New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines, whose jurisdiction includes the enforcement of the Game Act, has issued instructions to all inspectors, forest rangers, and game wardens providing, wherever possible, for the charitable disposal of all game meat seized under the New Brunswick Game Act.

The Departmental bulletin instructs its officers that "in all cases where the game meat is fit for human consumption at the time of the seizure" it is to be delivered "to any public institution such as a Municipal Home, Children's Home, or Hospital." With regard to cases occurring at points located at a considerable distance from such institutions "The Minister directs that the warden or ranger consult with the Poor Commissioner or Parish Clergy and ascertain the names of deserving families to whom the game meat may be delivered."

Cameraman Motors Britain Tour

Windsor, Ont., October 13. - From Hollywood to Dublin by automobile and steamer! That's the enjoyable trip recently completed by John Silver, motion picture cameraman. Mr. Silver, whose home was in the Irish Free State, was advised against the trip by his friends. Hundreds of obstacles, real and imaginary, were pointed out to him. "You'll just be wasting time and money," they said. "You'd better go the usual way."

The cameraman, whose job required him to do the unusual and "impossible" was not to be restrained. "I've made up my mind and I'm going," he told them.

TRIP A CINCH

"The trip was a perfect cinch," reported Mr. Silver upon his return, after six months. I was surprised, that the expense of taking the car was only slightly more than that of single passage. On arriving at Liverpool I found my car waiting for me on the dock, completely serviced.

"Driving on the left side of the road in crossing England was a bit awkward for a time but I soon got used to it. Although narrow, England's winding country roads spoiled did. I toured through Scotland and Wales and crossed the Channel to Ireland."

"The Irish country side is beautiful. Naturally I had a most enjoyable time chatting with old friends in Dublin - my home town. "British police are polite and courteous and displayed an astounding knowledge of roads and directions for the tourist. Storage rates also are reasonable, averaging about 50 cents per night. I returned to America on the Olympic, taking the Southern route through Florida to Hollywood, covering 4,050 miles in nine days."

Silver's reputation as a cameraman is much respected in photographic circles. He was cameraman on the attempted British Round-the-World flight in 1923 which ended when engine trouble forced the plane down in India. He served as a motorcycle dispatch rider during the World War. When he came to America he joined the Columbia Studios staff and was one of the cameramen on the big war picture, "Journey's End."

INSPECTS MEDICAL CLINIC

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 13. - Dr. A. J. Gilchrist, medical officers in charge of treatment and examinations of the Canadian National Railways, has arrived in Moncton to inspect the new medical clinic which has been installed here for the treatment and examination of railway employees.

The clinic has been installed in two railway cars which are the only ones of their kind in Canada. They are complete with operating room, X-ray equipment and facilities for sun-ray treatment. Dr. L. W. Fitzmaurice is in charge and assisting him is a registered nurse.

Employees in the sleeping, dining and parlor car services on the Canadian National are compelled to undergo a complete medical examination every three months while engine and train crews are also examined periodically both in respect of general health and vision and hearing. Modern high speed trains put a severe tax on the physical and mental capacities of those employed in the operation of trains and it has been found necessary to have engine and train crews undergo these periodic examinations from the standpoint of safety of passengers.

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 13. - The Canadian National Railways Atlantic Regional Officers cup for proficiency in First Aid work was presented to the winning team, representing the Motive Power Department, New Shop, Moncton, by W. E. Barnes, General Superintendent of Car Equipment. Several employees of the General Offices at Moncton were also among those receiving First Aid awards, the presentations being made by R. W. Simpson, Assistant General Manager. The awards in the cases of both the shop and General Offices employees were for first, second, third and fourth year work.

Retires After Half Century Of Service

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 13. - After completing over a century of service, Mr. James R. Burns, manager of the Canadian National Telegraphs at Moncton, N. B., has retired and has been placed on superannuation. Coming to Moncton from Hatfield's Point, Kings Co., N. B., where only thirteen years of age, he entered the employ of the Western Union Telegraph Company as a messenger on October 10th, 1877, and while so employed took up the study of the Morse code. After working as a messenger for a short period he left the telegraph service and entered the grocery business. Rejoining the telegraph service in 1881 he has remained ever since in that field, working up through various grades to the post of Manager of the Moncton commercial office. 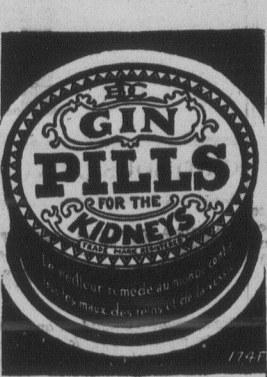
Madawaska, Maine
