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THIRTY-SEVEN KILLED IN TRACTION COLLISION

Excursion Train to St. Louis Crashed into Local Westbound Express at Staunton, Ill., and Both Trains Reduced to Splinters—Mistake in Orders Caused Tragedy—Death List May Reach 50.

Staunton Ills., Oct. 4.—Thirty-seven persons were killed and from 16 to 25 injured in a collision on the Illinois traction system two miles north of Staunton late today.

Only three of the dead have been identified as yet. They are:—J. E. Berry, Springfield, Ill., land commissioner for the Illinois Traction System.

W. N. Street Staunton Ill., assistant trainmaster of the traction system. D. V. Black, assistant superintendent of motive power and equipment.

The collision occurred between a local north bound and an excursion train headed towards St. Louis and loaded with passengers on their way to view the parade of the Velled Prophets at St. Louis.

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Going 40 Miles an Hour. Dickerson's curve is at the bottom of a decline both from the north and from the south. The local train and the second section of the excursion train were both on the curve.

The collision occurred right at the bottom of the double decline and sharp part of the curve. The cars were so close that it was impossible for either of them to stop to slow down.
