"Other cities in Canada are doing their best to attract manufacturers by offers of free sites, exemption from taxation, and large bonuses; many firms in Great Britain, the United States and Canada, are ready to take advantage of such offers. St. John is singularly deficient in suitable sites for factories, and it seems to be of the utmost importance at the present time, that as much level land in this vicinity as possible should be reclaimed when it can be done at a law cost. It would certainly seem to be a fatal mistake to allow the spoil from the present dredging contracts to be dumped at sea. The Imperial Dry Dock Company, therefore, propose to approach the provincial government and the commissioners of the city of St. John, with a view to obtaining financial assistance, either in the shape of subsidies or guarantees of interest on an issue of bonds to enable the company to reclaim sufficient land for the establishment of the above mentioned industries, and the erection of a shipbuilding plant."
