WHEN THE FLEECY SNOWFLAKES FALL

The large fleecy looking snowflakes that often bend down the branches of trees, and put a suggestion of fairyland on lawns and gardens, are more apt to fall in the early and late days of winter, when the temperature is near the freezing point, than at any other time. As these snowflakes need they closely after the sunshine reaches them, they should be pictured as soon as possible after the sun has put highlights and shadows on the scenes they create.

. A record can, of course, be secured without the aid of sunshine, but as direct sunshine adds snap and brilliancy to the lighting, the best pictures can be always be made while the sun is shining.

Since it is the newly fallen snow on the branches that furnishes the tive for the pictures, this snow should be so recorded that it will look though it were white and clean.

The best lighting effect is one which shows as much sunlight as possible on the trees and as many shadows as possible on the ground. This will place the emphasis of light where it belongs for such subjects—on the snow that is on the trees. This lighting effect can be recorded from any viewpoint from which the sun can be seen both in front of the subject and either to the right or left of the camera, or, in other words, from a viewpoint which places the sun behind and to one side of the camera.

If the background happens to be a mass of white clouds or blue sky, do not attempt to make pictures, as the white clouds or blue sky will photograph white (unless a filter be used) and it is obviously, impossible to clearly outline a white object against a white background.
