NORTH RIDING OF LANARK

TO THE BLECTO

GENTLEMEN,—It may appear somewhat premature to address you at this
early date, as a candidate for the Commons
at the approaching general election, especially as there is one session of the present
Parliament yet to be held; but the mere
mention of my name as a probable candidate having been the signal for the publication of numerous slanderous reports by
newspapers printed in another riding, and
circulating to a great extent in this (such
reports being calculated to give you a false
impression of my position) it is deemed
advisable I should take this step in order
to place myself in a proper light before o place myself in a proper light before

You are all familiar with the causes which, in 1864, led to the resignation of R. Bell, Esq., and the advent to this Riding of Hon. Wm. McDongall. Many of the electors on that occasion, while favorable to Confederation, were nevertheless opposed to the election of any other than a local condidate. Sympathising with this feeling candidate. Sympathising with this feeling which was not confined to any one party, l which was not connect to any one party, I complied with a requisition, signed by nearly four hundred electors, asking me to be the local candidate in opposition to Mr. McDougall. The result was not unanticipated by those who worked with me. All the influence of Sir John A. McDonald and the influence of Sir John A. McDonaid and his Government, and of many influential Reformers and Conservatives, was exerted against me, and this, added to the late date at which I was brought out, allowing no time for canvass, rendered the result at best doubtful. And here a word of explanation doubtful. And here a word of explanation as to my resignation on that occasion. On receiving the returns the evening of the first day's polling, it was found that I was behind at every polling place, and that the election was virtually lost. To save our friends farther labor, the committee consented to my resignation, which proved afterwards a very unwise step, giving serious cause of offence to many, as it was found cause of offence to many, as it was found impossible to communicate with them all in time to accomplish the object for which my resignation was intended.
Since that time I have taken very little

part in politics, in fact nothing more than to support Mr. Galbraith as your representative in the Ontario Parliament, and to take an active part in agitating the bringing him him out as a candidate for the Commons when it was understood Mr. McDougall's retirement was about to take place. The coalition formed in 1864, for the purpose of bringing about Confederation, has had other results than those which the promoters of that scheme probably contemplated. Old party lines have been almost obliterated; issues, the struggle over which at one time gave point to the names Conservative and Reformer, are dead or have heen finally settled, and to-day we find men who, under the old regime, were called Con-servatives and Reformers, working together in harmony, and in support of, or in opposi-tion to, the Government of the day, itself composed of men of both parties. The motto should therefore now be "men as well as measures," and the question of the hour is "the honest and faithful administration is "the honest and faithful administration of the affairs of the country, and a wise and economical management of its finances." I am confirmed in this view from the fact that many members of the Ontario Governthat many members of the Ontario Government, heretofore called Conservatives, are to-day found voting with and sustaining a Liberal Government under the leadership of Hon. Mr. Blake, against the Opposition led by Mr. M. C. Cameron. No one imagines for a moment that these gentlemen are sacrificing any principle in so doing; rather may we take it for granted their opinions are in full accord with those of the Liberal party as represented in the Ontario Governarty as represented in the Ontario Govern-

Holding these views and bearing in mind that at the approaching session of Parlia-ment, new issues may arise and changes be made which may give us reason to modify our opinions, I will now briefly course I feel it will be my duty to take, should you elect me to be your representa-

Whatever foundation there may Whatever foundation there may have been at one time for the cla m set up that the present Government should be retained in power until Confederation became an accomplished fact, none such can now exist. The no-party cry at the general election of 1867, and the dread of endangering the establishment of Confederation on a firm basis, contributed to give the McDonald-Cartier Government a new lease of power. The results have been unfortunate. A weak Cartier Government a new lease of power. The results have been unfortunate. A weak and cowardly truckling to a contemptible rebellion has distinguished the settlement of the terms on which Manitoba became a member of the Canadian Confederation; "banditti" have been fraternized with; the calls for justice on the marderers of Scott, a calls for justice on the marderers of Scott, a martyr on account of his Layalty to his country, have been met with contemptuous indifference; millions have been uselessly thrown away in the construction of the Intercolonial Railway; the late census taken at great cost, is completely worthless; while confidence in the ability or desire of the Government to rectify these criminal blunders, is utterly lost. Holding these views, and with no desire to indge the Government. and with no desire to judge the Government harshly, it will be my duty to oppose them, harshly, it will be my duty to oppose them, and when necessary sustain such men in the formation of a Liberal Government as we may have reason to believe will better meet the wishes of the people.

As it is a recognized fact that manufactures greatly increase the prosperity of any people, their encouragement will always receive my hearty support. Tending to this, is the importation free of duty of all

this, is the importation free of duty of all necessaries of life, so as to cheapen the cost of living to the laboring population—of all raw material necessary in the production of these manufactures—of all machinery such as is not made in the country, and a judicious arrangement of the tariff for revenue-purposes, which while operating to encourage native industries, will not be open to the objection of being pecially productive.

Since North Lanauk was set apart as a separate Riding, at has never been represented by a resident member. A longer continuance of this humiliating state of things must be regarded as a reflection upon ourselves. At the request, therefore, of many of the electors in different parts of the riding, I have consented to test the sense of the people on this question, by soliciting your suffrages as a local candidate at the forthcoming election, and am resolved in due time to prosecute the canvass vigorously and to continue the contest until the last vote is polled
