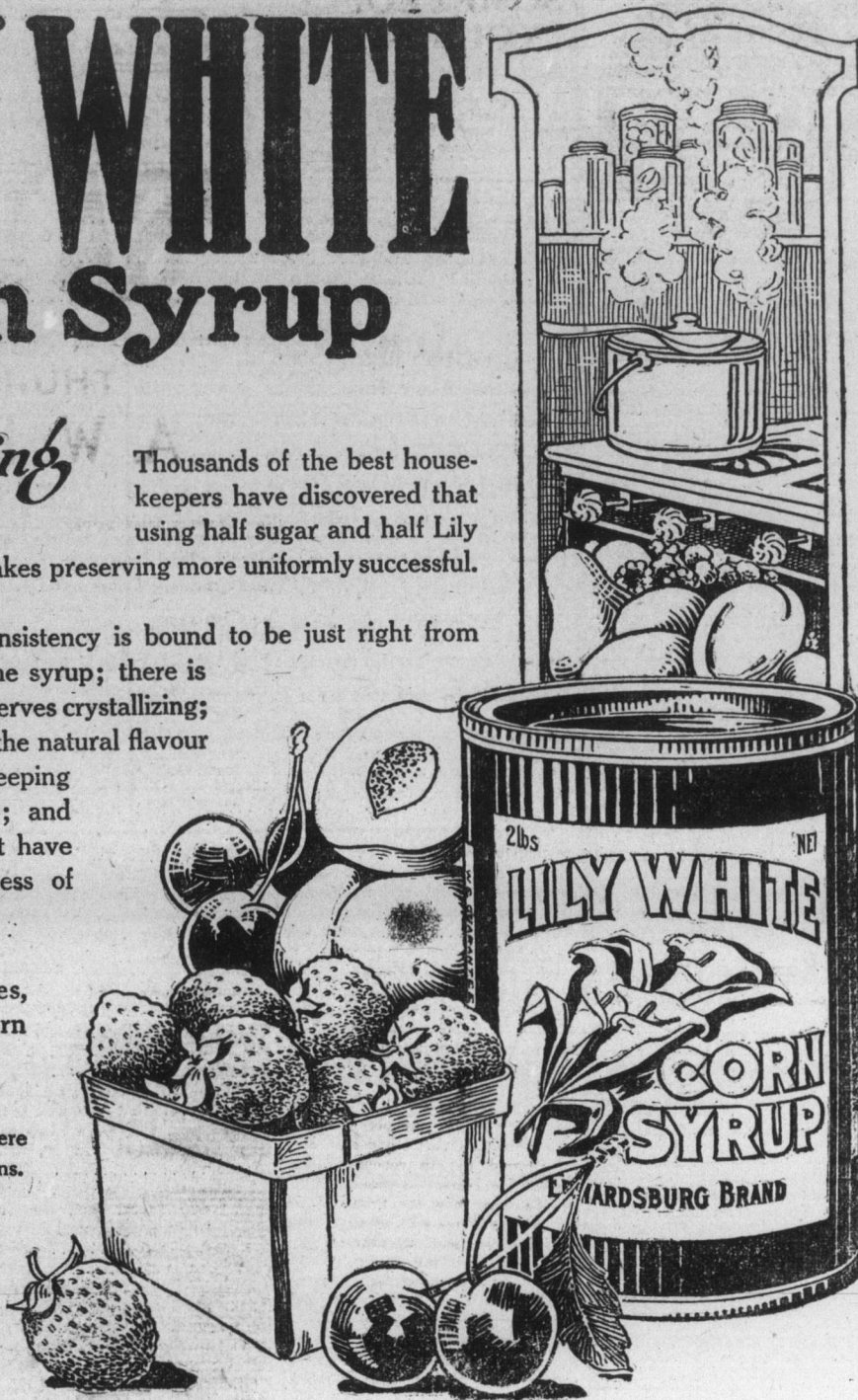

## REPORT FROM THE LAMBTON-MIDDLESEX DISTRICT.

FOREST, June 23.—Unlike some fruit districts of Ontario the local fruit belt, which extends through Northern Lambton and part of Middlesex, promises to produce a fair yield this year, if nothing unforeseen should occur.

Plums, peaches and apples are the chief crop around Thedford and Arkona and this town, and the output in a good year is large enough to supply a great part of Western Ontario and some of the demand from up the lakes as well. Growers state that the crop this year, while not large, is likely to be somewhere near the average.

### RainWould Help.

The long dry spell, which still continues here, is far from favorable to the young fruit, but it is felt that showers cannot now be delayed long. The district missed the rainstorms which visited London and other parts of Western Ontario last Friday and has been without a shower for weeks.

The orchards however at present appear to be in good condition and capable of withstanding a little more drought. Unless an absolute lack of moisture prevails from now till harvest time there will be a fair crop of all three of the fruits—plums, peaches and apples. Very few cherries or smaller fruits are grown here.

## MANY TRAINMEN AND SWITCHMEN REPORT FOR DUTY

The Second Death.  
WINNIPEG, June 23.—Steve Scherbanowicz died this evening in the general hospital of gangrene as the result of being shot in both legs. This is the second death from Saturday's rioting. All the others injured are said to be progressing satisfactorily.

WINNIPEG, June 23.—Although there was not looking evidence of nervous tension to-day the city remained calm. Special returned constables patrolled the city streets and the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, and the military forces were "standing by" prepared to meet any emergency.

The armored airplane, City of Winnipeg, made several reconnaissances over the city.

The only man to die as a result of Sturday's rioting, M. Sokolowski, was a registered alien and is stated to have broken parole. Witnesses assert that he took a prominent part in the attack on the police, which started the trouble.

### Injured Improve.

The seriously injured are making satisfactory progress.

John Grant, returned soldier, one of those who advocated the holding of the massed silent parade, in defiance of the edict of Mayor Gray, was placed under arrest to-day and it was said at police headquarters that a number of warrants had been issued against organizers of the demonstration.

Forty-four of the 100 arrested during the rioting were released this afternoon on \$1,000 bail each in a special session of the riot court. They were arraigned on charges of riotous assembly. The remainder remained until next week.

T.J. Murray, counsel for the strike leaders, arrested last week on a charge of seditious conspiracy, announced that their trial would probably be held on Wednesday.

It was stated that the federal authorities have ceased all action which might lead to a settlement of the general sympathetic strike. Senator Robertson, federal minister of labor, said: "The Riot Act has been read in Winnipeg and the federal government has turned its attention to maintaining law and order in this city. The preservation of the peace will continue until such time as the strike committees decide to call off the sympathetic strike."

The back-to-work movement went forward with renewed impetus to-day. Railway officials reported that a large number of trainmen and switchmen reported for duty.

Edward Heany, a young returned soldier was drowned at Burlington. Frank O'Connor was drowned by his skiff capsizing in Seely's Bay. Frank Bantam was killed by lightning while boating with his family on the Holland River, Bradford.

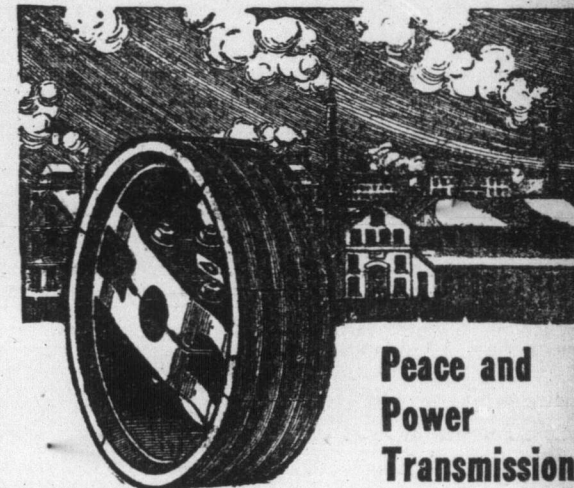
