upon persons who have come from other foreign countries, and upon reduced others, and discharged soldlers of foreign Corps late in his Majesty's service.

13th. Resolved—That the amendments adopted by the house of Assembly amount to a virtual rejection of the said bill, and are in opposition to the laws and established policy of Groat Britain and the United Stares, and therefore if passed into a statute by this legislature would afford no relief to many of those persons who were boro in the United States and are now settled in and have deserved well of this Province.

10th. Resolved—That as these amendments are at variance both with law and fact and inconsistent with the safety and welfare of the province; and as there scens to be no prospect that the two branches of the legislature will agree in any proper method of earrying His Majesty's gracious intentions, respecting Alleos residing in this Province; into effect, it appears expedient to appeal without delay to the lanperial Government to remedy the evils resulting from the course adopted by the House if Assembly by which they have placed themselves between the Royal grace and a respectable portion of the Inhabitauts of this colony.

30th. Resolved—That this house present an humble address to His Majesty supplicating His Majesty's Most gracious recommendation to His parliament to coufer upon such American citizens and other Foreigners now resident in this Province us are not subjects, all the rights and privileges of natives; and to pass such a law for the naturalization of all foreigners, whether from the United States or other countries, who may hereafter come into the province as shall in the wisdem of parliament, best suitour situation and circumstances; and in the meantime to increase the emigration from the United Kingdom which has been so happily begun.
