

the Department would like to have the number and names of Indians who would settle at the point in question, and he was asked for his opinion as to area of land, etc.

Mr. Wilson sent a list of heads of families now residing at Obidgewan, and he says an area of 60 acres per family should be allowed, that the land selected is exceptionally good for raising hay, potatoes, etc.

Sept. 27, 1912. The Department asked Mr. Wilson to find out whether Indians of Weymontachine and Coucoucache earnestly desirous to surrender their reserves and proceed to Obidgewan or elsewhere.
