Sir,-

In regard to communication of the 10th instant, addressed Mr. Calvert, M. P., by Chief Cornelius Logan, Councillor George E. Dolson and Louis Logan, in regard to desire of Mr. Daniel Dolson, a member of the Muncsey Band, to acquire the W. $\frac{1}{2}$ of the N. $\frac{1}{2}$ of lot 5, in the 3rd range, Caradoc, which, apparently, should be 4th range, I beg to say that the W. $\frac{1}{2}$ of the N. $\frac{1}{2}$ of lot 5, range 4, is a portion of the tract of land on the Caradoc reserve purchased by the Muncsey band from the Chippewas, and can be transferred or located to any member of the Muncsey band. This land was located to the late Josiah J. Wilson, who in April, 1895, willed the property to his nephew, Francis Webster Logan, an illegitimate son of his sister. If, as represented, Francis Webster Logan has died intestate, there would be a failure of heirs, and the property would revert to the Muncsey band and could be located to any member thereof in the usual way, as required by the Act, but it would be well to submit evidence as to death of Francis Webster Logan and intestacy through the local Indian agent, in order that the Department may pass on the matter.
