No. 260. Confidential. Under-Secretary of State, whom I saw at noon at his request, after referring to our conversations of September 27th of which you are aware, and in view of your acceptance in principle, which I was then enabled to intimate, showed me a letter from the Attorney General, who would himself propose to visit Ottawa on November 11th and November 12th for discussions upon "the problem of simplifying our border-crossing procedures". Mr. Jackson would be accompanied by Mr. Hoover, Director of Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Mr. Hart of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

- 2. It is proposed that the conference be informal and non-committal for the present. In the circumstances, neither Mr. Jackson nor Mr. Welles consider it necessary to suggest an Agenda (other than what is involved in a bove quotation), but would be prepared to submit one if considered advisable.
- 3. It is especially desired here that no announcement be made until immediately before the conference. Recognizing that such a visit could not take place without public comment, it is suggested that when the time comes a frank statement be released by the Canadian authorities, and that an agreed statement be published at the conclusion of discussions.
