No. 12 Weedin, is on the left bank about half a mile above No. 11. Indian Billy Williams has recently built a new shack high above the river. The fishing stages on the rocks along the river are very numerous in this vicinity, evidently there is a good deal of fishing later in the season.

No. 13 An gl a o, Opposite No. 12. Only a shack and two salmon caches. About two acres of good land lies between the back of the shack and the mountains, but they have in norway been utilized. Arthur Johnson claims this place.

No. 14 Sho wa mal let, is on the left bank of the Skeena about a quarter of a mile above No. 13. The canyon here is very precipitous and the Indians fish throughout it. No shack on this place, which belonged to Alexanders ancestors.

No. 15 Kiss an usk co. On the right bank of the river 200 yards above No. 14. A good station consisting of a shack and two salmon caches. This is the only place on the river where there is a small garden. Charley Smith is the claimant and has a big family. It is said that twenty-five Indians use this place.

No. 16 An sa haws ko, on the left bank belongs to Sam Barlow. It is situated in the canyon about 200 yards above No. 15. The improvements consist of a shack and a drying shed. This is a good station and is much used.

No. 17 Din we ha lits, about a quarter of a mile above No. 16, is only a fishing resort.

No. 18 Gulmak, on the right bank of the river is about 200 yards above No. 17. Here "Moses" has a shack and salmon cache. The river in this place is confined to a narrow channel  
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
