personal work. The ward was furnished complete in every detail including a liberal supply of linen, dressing gowns, and night dresses. All the sewing for these was done by the ladies who had the use of the room and sewing machines of the women's auxiliary.

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Her Excellency Lady Grey was accompanied by Mrs. Hanbury-Williams and Lord Bury. None of the guests entered the ward till after their arrival. When all had gathered, Miss Fitzpatrick, the May Queen, on behalf of the club handed over the ward. In doing so she said:

« It is with a deep feeling of pleasure, almost pride, that as president of the May Court club, I to day, give over to the hospital authorities this children's ward, and yet I fully realize how very little I have done. When the idea was suggested to me the undertaking seemed quite beyond us. The small revenue
