OBITUARY

MRS. JAMES MAHAR The death of Mrs. James Mahar occurred at her home, Castalia, on Wednesday, March 10, after a lingering illness age 68 years. She leaves, besides her husband, to mourn, three sons, two daughters, three brothers and four sisters. Interment took place at the Maple Grove Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Hovey conducted the funeral services.

R. P. MCGIVERN The death took place 11th March of Richard P. McGivern, barrister at law, son of the late Richard P. McGivern. He was born at St. John in 1856 and educated at the St. John Grammar School, where he won the Corporation gold medal, in 1872. Previous to entering the University of New Brunswick, he was tutored by the late Dr. Costigan of St. John. He was graduated from the University of New Brunswick, obtaining the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1875, studied law with the late Charles W. Welden, Q. C., and was admitted an attorney in 1878 and barrister in 1880. Mr. McGivern married Miss Emma Louise, daughter of the late Charles S. Taylor, St. John, by whom he had one child, Margaret Constance. Besides his wife and daughter, two sisters and one brother survive. The sisters are Mrs. George McKinn and Miss Clara O. McGivern, and the brother, James S. McGivern of this city, Judge Savary, of Annapolis, (N. S.), is his uncle. The late Mr. McGivern was an alderman from Kings ward from 1886 until the union in 1889.—St. John Globe.

JAMES MCLAY The Daily Boomerang, Laramie, Wyo., contains an account of the death recently of James McLay, president of the McLay, Bunting Sheep Co., and who was for many years associated with Chamcook's Farm at St. Andrews, and was well known throughout this province. He was associated with F. E. Cams of Montreal, and was a frequent exhibitor at our exhibitions and also attracted some attention by the exhibition of his collie dog "Henry" at local dog shows. Mr. McLay's death took place in Laramie. He was found lying face downward on the sidewalk where he had been overcome by an apoplectic attack. GERMAN CRUISER SUNK 13 VESSELS Rio Janeiro, March.—The German auxiliary cruiser Kron Prinz Wilhelm, which has aboard 500 German sailors, has sunk thirteen vessels since she began her raid in commerce, according to the passengers and crew of the French steamer Guadeloupe, who were taken to Pernambuco by the British steamer Churchill. The Guadeloupe was sent to bottom by the Kron Prinz Wilhelm, near the island of Fernando de Noronha, off the eastern extremity of Brazil.

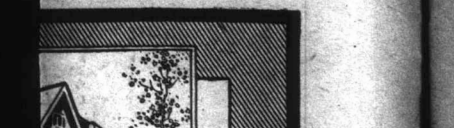
