ATHLETICS AND NAPS WERE BOTH BEATEN

Athletics Had Only Four Hits Off Leverenz of St. Louis.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 19.—Leverenz held Philadelphia to four scattered hits here yesterday, and St. Louis won the game by 5 to 0. Battery and fielding errors by Shawkey and Schang gave the visitors their first two runs, while they bunched four hits with a pass, in the ninth, and tallied three more runs. Grand slammer of Binghampton, N. Y., made a fine impression at third base for St. Louis. He fielded his position well, and got two singles and a pass in four times to the plate. Score: St. Louis 5, Philadelphia 0.

RENFER WAS WILD AND SENATORS WON. WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Washington emerged from a batting slump yesterday and beat Detroit by 6 to 1. Renfer started for Detroit and lasted six innings, during which time he was hit safely five times. He was wild, and before he gave way to Harding five runs had crossed the plate. ED WALSH TWIRLED FOR THE WHITE SOX. NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—New York retained its one point hold on seventh place by defeating Chicago in the third game of the series by a score of 6 to 3. Ed Walsh, the former star of the Chicago pitching staff, pitched the last four innings for Chicago, it being the first time he has appeared in the box in two months. He gave a good account of himself, New York counting only once off him. The score: Chicago 3, New York 6.

Tough Wrestling. FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Sept. 19.—Walter Miller, world's welter weight wrestling champion and George Walker, Canadian middleweight champion, went through two hours of the toughest sort of wrestling and grappling before the match was called, without either securing a fall. During the final fifteen minutes, Miller tried rough tactics, and was able to throw Walker off the stage, but the latter landed on his feet.

Economic Crisis. ANTWERP, Belgium, Sept. 19.—Depression in the world's rubber trade has caused an economic crisis here. Many of the rubber companies in the Congo have discharged their European agents and large bodies of native rubber collectors. The over production has caused rubber on the international markets to be reduced below the cost of gathering and transporting the rubber.

No Hopeless Unemployed In Britain, Says P. M. Draper

Ottawa Labor Official on Return From England, Declares Conditions Have Improved.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—The condition of labor in the British Isles has improved wonderfully in the past few years and is becoming better still. From what I saw and heard I gather that there are fewer men out of work than have walked the streets for many a year before. It is no longer safe to talk of the hopeless unemployed of Great Britain.


In these words, Mr. P. M. Draper, Canadian representative at the British Trade Union Congress at Manchester, England, expresses his views of conditions in England. He was just returned from attending the International Labor Congress in Manchester.

There were over five hundred delegates, representing 3,500,000 organized workers in the British Isles, at the congress. The immigration question and the existing Dublin car strike claimed a good deal of attention. The refusal of the Dublin police to allow the strikers to hold public meetings was strongly condemned.
