OFFER IS WITHDRAWN. SAID'S MAJOR LEONARD. Matter of Military Residence for Kingston not to be Reconsidered With Queens. KINGSTON, July 11.—With regard to the statement made here by the Minister of Militia on Thursday that the Leonard military residence proposition for Kingston was not yet dead, and that this city would get the buildings, Major R. W. Leonard, who is now at his home in St. Catharines, when queried, made the following statement: "My proposition to Queen's University is absolutely withdrawn because the trustees demanded conditions in my mind threatening to pervert the object of the gift. If the question be reconsidered it will not be with the trustees or the senate."
