Many of those intending to exhibit, were found to be very anxious upon the point and were dubious about the result of a hasty mobilization.

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

The bombardment of Belgrade, Serbia's capital, by Austrian artillery marked the opening of actual hostilities between Austria and Serbia. Abandoning their capital, the Serbians retreated to have blown up the bridge over the Save River which connects Austria with Serbia to halt an invasion by Austrian troops.
