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THE CONTRACTORS

For the New King Street Pavement Are in the City.

Mr. Lynch Outlines the Manner in
 Which the Work Will be
 Proceeded With.

J. E. Lynch, of the firm of Lynch &
 Lynch, whose tender for the contract for
 laying the new King street pavement has
 been accepted by the city, with Thos. F.
 Stockton, master mechanic of the company,
 arrived in the Maple City late last evening.
 They came on from Flint, Mich., where
 they have just closed a large \$25,000 con-
 tract, and held a busy interview with Ald.
 McKeeough, chairman of the local board of
 works, with a view to completing prelimi-
 nary preparations for the work here.
 In a short interview with The Planet Mr.
 Lynch said every effort would be made to
 push the work along in an energetic and
 business-like manner.

"We could commence next Monday," he
 said, "to test the old street up, but in the
 city is purchasing its own brick, it will be
 advisable to first arrange for the ship-
 ments. Nothing is more justly annoying
 to residents and ratepayers than to have a
 street torn up and lying idle in that way
 waiting for material. Consequently we de-
 sire to complete all arrangements for ship-
 ment first."

"I should estimate that it will perhaps
 be 30 days before we get at the job prop-
 erly, that, however, we will be setting the
 curb and putting in sewers."

"How long do you estimate it will take to
 complete the contract?" was asked.
 "About six or seven weeks after the start
 is made. Every dispatch will be used and
 a member of the firm will be here to over-
 see the work."

"Do you intend to use home labor?"
 The Planet queried.
 "Decidedly," was the prompt response.

"We will hire all Chatham labor, with the
 exception of probably a couple of experts,
 and will secure everything possible in your
 city in a contract such as this I find it
 not only the right but also the most profit-
 able method to adopt."

Messrs. Lynch and Stockton will remain
 in the city during the next few days mak-
 ing preparations for the work.
