Mr. Lynch Outlines the Manner in Which the Work Will be Proceeded With.

J. E. Lynch, of the firm of Lynch & ynch, whose tender for the contract for Lynch, whose tender for the contract for laying the new King street pavement has been accepted by the city, with Thos. F. Stockton, master machanic of the company, arrived in the Maple City late last evening. They came on Irom Flint, Mich., where they have just closed a large \$25,000 con, tract, and held a busy interview with Ald. McKeough, chairman of the local board of works, with a view to completing preliminary preparations for the work here.

In a sbort interview with The Planet Mr. Lynch said every effort would be made to push the work along in an energetic and

business-like manner.

"We could commence next Monday," ha said, "to tear the old street up, but as the city is purchasing, it own brick, it will be advisable to first arrange for the ship ments. Northing is more justly annoying to residents and ratepayers than to have a street torn up and lying idle in that way waiting for material. Consequently we desire to complete all arragements for shipment first.
