THOSE HOG PENS

Board of Health Will Seek Provincial Aid

In Compelling the Railways to Abate the Nuisance—Diseases Reported.

The local board of health held its regular monthly session yesterday afternoon. There were present, Chairman Dunlop, Dr. Bray, Robert Pritchard, Otis B. Hullin, M. H. O. Dr. Hall and Inspector Jos. R. Guttridge.

Inspector Guttridge produced his official report for the month as follows:—

Since the last meeting there have been 56 closets cleaned. The complaint made by John Piggott, on Raleigh street, has been attended to. As regards the G. T. R. hog pens complaint of stench, etc., I find that the outside of the said pens is at all times damp. The floors of the pens are perfectly dry whenever they are shipping hogs. There is always a stench. There were eleven dead hogs taken away from the pens. Fifty-three cesspools have been cleaned. They are not all finished yet. I have frequently disinfected houses and offices by direction of the M. H. O. At his suggestion I do not include these in my report as it might at times create unnecessary alarm and interfere with business. Received.

DR. HALL'S REPORT.

Dr. Hall, the M. H. O., presented the following report:—

Since your last meeting diphtheria and scarlet fever have both been reported. Of the fever there were two cases on Centre street, one on Shelton avenue and one on Victoria avenue. Of the latter there were two cases in one family on Park avenue. I have not succeeded in tracing any of these cases to the source of contagion, but it is quite probable that mild cases preceded them and were unreported.

The hog nuisance created by the railroads shipping hogs, I understand, was referred by the city back to the board with a recommendation that the local board call in the board of the provincial board of health. I think that if the shipping point or points were changed, other municipalities would become interested. It would be to act on this recommendation.

I would recommend that at least 100 copies of circular No. 15, re management of contagious diseases by the householder, be purchased for the use of the health inspector. His supply is about exhausted.

In accordance with instructions the chairman, Mr. Dunlop, and myself attended the convention of Health Officers of Ontario, held in Kingston on August 14th and 15th. Very interesting and instructive. A paper by Professor McGill, of Ottawa, on poisonous food adulteration, was unusually interesting and instructive.

The balance of Dr. Hall's report dealt very interestingly with the subject of Consumption, its Prevention and Cure, and this will be found elsewhere in a separate article.

The 100 circulars, giving instruction as to the manner in which the spread of contagious diseases may be prevented, will be purchased and a copy posted in each house where such disease exists.

The resolution which the city council passed at their last meeting, recommending that the railway hog pen nuisance should be referred back to the board of health and advising the board to request the provincial board of health in the matter, was read.

Mr. Pritchard—I think that we should make a clean sweep while we are at it, and I will move that any resolution passed shall refer to the pens of the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific and Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway.

Inspector Guttridge—I have looked over the G. T. R. pens and am of the opinion that there will be a stench so long as the wooden floor is left there.

Mr. Hullin—I agree with the inspector and will second Mr. Pritchard's motion.

The resolution passed. It instructs the secretary to communicate with the provincial board of health and ask their co-operation in any action which may be taken with a view to having the C. P. R., G. T. R. and L. E. & D. R. pens removed outside the city limits.

The expenses of Chairman Dunlop and Dr. Hall, who acted as the Board's delegates to the convention of the Provincial Medical Health Officers' Association, at Kingston, will amount to \$80. The delegates, owing to some little kick which arose last year, wished to ask for \$25 apiece, but the other members of the board would not countenance any such proceeding.

Mr. Pritchard—Every cent of your justifiable expenses should be paid by the city. Put in for the whole amount.

The rest concurred and the account for the \$80 was passed.

SHY OF TEACHERS.

The School Board Found Itself Two or Three Short.

New Appointments Made—The Late Principal Voted a Month's Salary.

The school board met last evening. There were present, Chairman J. A. Wilson, W. N. Morley, J. E. Johnston, Andrew Thomson, R. M. Paxton, Dr. K. V. Bray and Wm. Robertson. In the absence of T. C. Macnab, Mr. Johnston was on motion made secretary of the meeting.

Applications for teachers were received from Miss Elsie Lafferty, Miss Agnes Healey, Woodstock, and Miss Olive Norton. The two last applications were ordered to be put on file.

Chairman Johnston, of the finance committee, reported as follows:—

Central school—Telegraphing \$2.07, Mail Empire 84 cents, Thos. Stone & Son \$1.45, A. E. Pelette \$4, S. T. Watson \$2.40, C. E. Hammond \$35.28, Harris and Brooks \$12, Cucksey & Pritchard \$9.75, James Watt & Sons \$2.50, teachers' salaries \$208.31, janitor \$35.41, total \$314.01.

McKeough school—D. C. Clements \$2.75, J. Watt & Sons \$2.65, teachers' salaries \$237.48, janitor \$29.16, total \$272.04.

Queen street school—Teachers' salaries \$74.99, janitor \$10.25, total \$85.24.

Payne school—Jas. Scott \$3, Cucksey & Pritchard 90c, teachers' salaries \$54.16, janitor 9, total \$67.06.

Central kindergarten—R. Cooper \$45.64, teachers' salaries \$48.33, total \$93.97.

McKeough kindergarten—Teachers' salaries \$23.33, caretaker of King street school \$1, total \$24.33.

The report as a whole was adopted.

The account of N. Murray for \$13 was referred to finance committee with power.

TEACHERS APPOINTED.

Dr. Bray, for the managers of the Central, reported that the two teachers whose application had been accepted, had sent word that they had secured other situations.

The managers had again gone over the applications and had decided on Miss Bell, of Alliston, and Miss Doherty, of Clinton. The doctor moved that the action of the managers be confirmed and the motion carried.

Mr. Cathcart asked to have the fire insurance policy which he had transferred to the Anglo-American Company. Referred to the chairman of the board, the chairman of finance and the secretary.

Wm. Robertson said in reference to Mr. Smith, late principal of the Central, that the board had decided to pay him \$25. As he had been suspended from his calling, Mr. Robertson thought that it was nothing but right for the board to recognize the late principal's good qualities, good behavior and good work by giving him a month's salary in full. Mr. Robertson so moved and the motion carried.

A MISSING TEACHER.

Dr. Bray enquired if the board had given Miss McKellar leave of absence for another week.

Mr. Wilson said that Miss McKellar had not put in an appearance. It seemed to him that she should have been present in view of the many changes in the school staff.

Mr. Morley considered that the matter should be inquired into.

Dr. Bray said that Miss McKellar had sent Miss McGeorge to take her place.

Mr. Wilson felt that it wouldn't be a bad idea to give Miss McKellar a two-week's holiday without salary since her action had still further demoralized the school.

Mr. Robertson thought it the proper thing to do. The board were the guardians of the people's interests and they should be carefully looked after.

Mr. Johnston said that it was just possible Miss McKellar might be ill.

On motion of Mr. Johnston the matter was referred to the managers of the school to deal with.

Dr. Bray reported that the Model school had opened with 23 pupils in attendance. There were three more enrolled so that there would be 26 in the school.

Andrew Thomson stated that Miss Green had written him that she would be unable to reach Chatham on her return from the old country before next Saturday and he in consequence had made arrangements for Miss Schwenker to take her place till she arrived.

TROOPER GLOVER

Coming Home by England—He is Recovering From a Long Illness.

A letter has been received by his father in Fletcher, from Trooper W. M. Glover, who went from this city with the second mounted Canadian contingent to fight in South Africa. There was a report some time ago that Trooper Glover was dead, but this letter sets that at rest. He had, however, been seven weeks ill with enteric fever, and at the time of writing was just convalescing in Winberg, Trooper Glover was in Lord Roberts' advance from Bloemfontein, and participated in four fights between there and Koonstad. At Koonstad, however, he was taken ill with enteric fever, and sent to Springfield. For seven weeks there they only allowed him some milk each day. Later 12 ounces of bread was added and this was subsequently increased to 1-1/2 lbs. of bread, together with chicken. He had, however, had settled in one of his legs, and he was ordered to be invalided home. He was given the alternative of being sent direct to England, or first to England. He chose England. He says the boys did not mind the Mausers in the least, but when the Long Toms got playing on them the shells made them all "duck."
