DEATH IN THE VIAL.

THE FIFTH TABLET CARRIED A DOSE THAT WAS FATAL

Why the Doctor Had a Premonition That Misfortune Had Overtaken a Wealthy Planter-How the Story of the Crime Leaked Out. The story was told by a police com-

missioner of another city who was in New Orleans recently on a visit. "The most ingenious murder I ever knew anything about," he said, "was

committed by a young physician. He was a rising practitioner at a place where I formerly lived, and, with your permission, I will speak of him simply s Dr. Smith. "About a dozen years ago, as nearly

as I remember, this young man went on a visit to a relative in a neighbor ing city, and one afternoon, on the third or fourth day of his stay, he startled a lady member of the household by remarking that he 'had a feeling that some misfortune had overtaken a wealthy planter whom they both knew very well, and whom I will call Colonel Jones. The colonel was a prominent resident of the docters home town and had a large outlying estate, which he was in the habit of visiting once a week.

"On the day of Smith's singular prenonition he was on one of those tours of inspection, but failed to come back, and the following morning his corpse was found lying in a cornfield. He had evidenty been dead about 24 hours, and from the appearance of the body seemed to have been seized with

some sort of fit or convulsion. "Of course the affair created a great stir, and the police made a pretty thorough investigation, but the only thing they found that merited any special attention was a small, round vial in the dead man's vest pocket. It was about the diameter of a lead pencil by four inches long, and had originally contained a couple of dozen medicinal tablets, which, lying one on top of the other, filled the little bottle to the cork. A few still remained in

"Upon inquiry it was learned without trouble that the tablets were a harmless preparation of soda, and that Jones himself had bought them at a local drug store. That ended suspicion in that quarter, and, for lack of any thing better, the coroner returned a verdict of death from sunstroke. There was no autopsy.

"Some time after Jones had been buried," continued the police commissioner, "I learned accidentally of Dr. Smith's curious prophecy, and it set me to thinking. Eventually I evolved a theory, but it was impossible at the time to sustain it with proof, and for five or six years I kept it pigeonholed in my brain, waiting for something to happen. Meanwhile, to everybody's surprise, Dr. Smith went to the dogs. He began by drinking heavily, gradually lost his practice, and finally skipped out to avoid prosecution for cashing a fake draft. After his flight I learned enough to absolutely confirm my theory as to Jones' death. What had really happened was this:

"Dr. Smith owed the old man a considerable sum of money and had given a note, upon which he had forged his father's name as indorser. The plant er was pressing him for payment and had threatened suit, which meant inevitable exposure. One day, while they were conversing. Jones pulled out a little glass vial and swallowed one of the tablets it contained, remarking that he took one daily, after dinner, for sour stomach.

"That suggested a diabolical scheme of assassination, which the doctor proceeded to put into execution. Repairing to his office, he made up a duplicate tablet of strychnine, and; encountering the colonel next day, asked him to let him have the vial for a moment, so he could copy the address of the makers from the label.

"Jones handed it over unsuspecting ly, and while his attention was briefly diverted elsewhere Smith put in the prepared tablet. He placed it under the top four, thus making it reasonabiy certain that his victim would take it on the fifth day from that date. Next morning he left town, so as to be far away when the tragedy was consummated, and some mysterious, uncontrollable impulse evidently led him to make the prediction that first excited my suspicion.

"When I made certain of all this, I located Smith in Oklahoma and was on the point of applying for an extradition warrant when he anticipated me by contracting pneumonia and dying. thereupon returned the case to its mental pigeonhole, where it has remained ever since."

"Pardon me for asking," said one of the listeners, "but is that really a true story, or are you entertaining us with interesting fiction?"

"It is absolutely true," replied the narrator. "But how did you learn the particu-

ars?" "Well," said the police commissioner smiling, "Smith was like most ciever eriminals-he had one weak spot. He was fool enough to tell a woman. She

MANY MINES CLOSED.

Strikers in Pennsylvania Coal District, Are Standing Firm and Making Daily

Gains-The Operators' Efforts. Shenandoah, Pa., Sept. 26.—The few developments in the strike situation here since Monday were favorable to the strikers. Three additional collieries were closed vesterday in this region, because the number of men who reported for duty was not sufficient to operate them. In this city but one collery is working. That is the Cambridge, which has its

full complement of men. Other collieries in this tegion still in operation are the Bast, at Ash-land; Potts at Locustdale; Locust Spring at Locust Gap, and the North Franklin at Trevorton. The colliery is said to be shorthanded English-speaking mine workers this borough yesterday formed a branch of the United Mine Workers and 250 men are said to have joined

the union. The troops yesterday had nothing to occupy their time but guard duty, practice marches and regimental parades.

It was learned last night that Sheri? Harvey of this (Luzerne) county has telegraphed to Governor Stone asking that troops be sent to this county on the ground that he (the sheriffi cannot guarantee the safety of persons or property during the luvernor it is understood, is conidering the matter.

The strikers met after midnight at Cranberry, and when they reached Tombicken they were stopped by Sheriff Harvey and 30 armed depu-ties, who went to that place on a special train. The sheriff read the Riot Act to them. The strikers then scattered in different directions and began missionary work in preventing nine workers from going to the Potts mines. They were successful in preventing a large number of men rom going to work, and in conse quence the Derringer and the Gowen sloje was only slightly affected. Four of the marchers were arrested, charged with breach of the peace,

and were taken to South Wilkesbarre and committed without bail. PREMIER MARCHAND DEAD. The First Minister of the Ouebec Govern

ment Has Passed Away. Quebec, Sept. 26 .- Hon. F. G. Marchand, Premier of Quebec, died at 7.45 last evening. Hon. Felix Gabriel Marchand was the son of Gabriel Marchand, mer-

chant, of St. John's, Quebec. He was born at St. John's Jan. 9, 1832, and received his education at the College of St. Hyacinthe. He was made a notary public in 1855, and enetered the practice of his profession in his native town, where he remaind until his death. He was returned to the Legislature as member for St. John's in 1867, and had occupied the seat continuously since. He was in the Joly Government in 1878-79, first as Provincial Secretary and aferwards as Commissioner of Crown ands, and was Speaker of the Assembly from 1878 to 1892. On the late Mr. Mercier's defeat in 1892 he became leader of the Liberal party in the Legislature, and as such opposed Mr. Flynn in the campaign of 1897. On the latter's defeat at the polls and consequent resignation, Mr. Marchand was called upon to form a new Administration, and was worn into the office of Treasurer in the new Cabinet. Deceased was for many years an active journalist, and did much to elevate the tone of the French-Canadian press. Mr. Mar-chand won distinction as the author of several dramatic works, among them "Fatenville," a comedy (1869). "Errors of a Count" (1872), a vaudevillo sketch; "Un Bonheur en Attire un Autre," a comedy (1884), and "Les Faux Brilliants," comedy (1885). Later on he published a manual treating of the notarial profession in Canada. Shortly after the Trent affair he took the lead in the

To keep off the corching sun's rays, they envelop their heads in white linen scarfs, worn like the nuns and sisters of mercy, and over this wear either the sunbonnet, or "cappie," or a large straw hat tied under the chin with strings. Four girls in one house where the corre-spondent was staying surprised their visitor by singing the familiar old songs, "In the Gloaming" and "Just Before the Battle, Mother," in preference to Dutch songs. As only one curious to hear the others join in the choruses. The daughter of the house is always the one to bring the customary cup of coffee to the visitors. At the same house the daughters entertained their visitor in their bed-

room by showing her box after box full of elaborate crochet-work, counterpanes, antimacassars, and yards and yards of crocheted lace frillings, which they had made. They are also very clever makers of paper bowers, and many of the parlors and entertaining rooms are freely adorned with colored bunches and festoons of them. In some houses the bedroom walls are adorned with pages from fashionbooks. The ignorance of the Boer girls is sometimes surprising. One old Dutch "frau" quite thought that there were Kaffirs or black people all over the world, and no doubt wondered how the English could get any work done with no servants at command.

Three Excellent Recipes.

CHEESE BISCUITS.—Place ounces of Parmesan cheese and four ounces of pastry bower in a basin, with a little salt and a few grains of cayenne. Rub into this two ounces of butter and make into a stiff dough with the yolk of an egg. Roll the pastry out thinly, cut it into rounds, prick with a fork and bake in a cool. oven until crisp. Keep these biscuits

in a tin until quite cool. PRUNE JELLY .- Take one quart of prunes, stir until soft and mash brough colander; half a box of gelatine; put in bowl, cover with cold water, let it soak for about five minutes: take a pint and a half of the mashed prunes, add to the gelatine, with three tablespoonfuls of sugar; put on the stove,, and let boil for five minutes; pour into jelly moulds and serve with

cream. EGGS A LA JOSEPHINE.-Boil six eggs twenty minutes. Remove the shells. Separate the yolks without breaking; cut the whites in thin, nar-row slices, and mix them with an equal quantity of fine shredded cooked fish and a tablespoonful of fine parsley. Place the mixture on a platter in a circular or oval ring, and put the yolks in the centre. Set the platter in a steamer to heat the mixture. Make a pint of thick white sauce and pour around the edge of the dish,
