THE NEW BOAT

D. W. Crow's new tug was launched
at 5:45 yesterday afternoon in the
presence of about 200 people. The
boat, a splendidly modeled craft,
dropped gracefully into the water.
It had a drop of about four feet after
leaving the skids. This threw the
boat rather on her side and in this
position she struck the water, ship-
ping about ten barrels of water, but
righting herself immediately after.
The boat was christened the D. W.
Crow by Frank Crow, who took the
big jump with the boat and broke
a bottle of champagne over the prow
as he murmured "safe comes the ship
to harbor, through tempest and
storm, if one of the Crow brothers
sails smiling on the water." He then
christened the boat the D. W. Crow
after the owner. The boat is only 70
feet over all and is intended for river
work only. Mr. Crow says the boat

FIRST FISH STORY

Ex-Ald. A. Phelps, as everybody
knows, is an enthusiastic angler, but
he has never yet ventured into that
field of sport so often invaded by Vi-
tal Goudreau, A. C. McKay, Walter
Thrasher and well, others.

Mr. Phelps, however, has proved
that even he can tell a good fish
story when he wants to.

"I never saw pickered more plentiful
than they were 34 years ago," said the
ex-Alderman and fisherman. "I was
living then in the house down on the
bank of the river where Capt. Stringer
now lives. During the spring freshet
the water came up almost to my back
door. I went out to get a pail of
water one morning and saw the water
in front of the house alive with pick-
ered. The fish were going up stream
and the current being swift, they
were tired and had stopped to rest in
the calm water backed up in my back
yard. I just stood on the back stoop
and kicked six fish in on the kitchen
floor."

The river had risen during the night
and the well was under water. Well,
when the water went down that well
was just alive with pickered. I left
the fish in the well, and all summer
whenever we wanted fresh fish, all I
did was to draw a bucket of water."

Angus R. Crow has a fish story he
tells, too. He says that if you throw
a live fish on the ice and let it freeze
and stay frozen for a couple of days
and, coming back after a couple of
days, cut a hole in the ice and throw
the frozen fish into the water, it will
revive and swim away. The same
thing can be noticed in the case of
frogs. One day, when Mr. Crow was
going to school he saw a frog frozen
in a cake of ice. He tried to get the
frozen jumper out of the cake of ice,
but it was so firmly imbedded. During
the day, it thawed, and when Mr.
Crow went home from school he found
the cake of ice with only a hole in it
where the frog had been. It was im-
possible to save the ice and show the
hole, but Mr. Crow can still show the
ditch by the road where he saw the
frog frozen in the ice.
