MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE

No Clue Can Be Found As To The Whereabouts Of W. T. Rankin

MR. ANDERTON'S STORY

Thomas Anderton, of Boldoon St. Dover, who was one of the foremos in the searching party who dragged the River Sydenham in the hope of finding the remains of the missing William T. Rankin, was in Chatham

William T. Renkin, was in Chatham yesterday, and while in town he was interviewed by a Planet reporter.

Mr. Anderton, who was intimately acquainted with the missing man, says that some of the first details given out in connection with the disappearance were not entirely cor-

He says that W. T. Rankin and a
man named Jackson left the former's place December 6, with a load
of wood, which they transferred to
the electric car at the 11th concession. Both afterwards left for Wallaceburg on the car which leaves the
11th concession at 2.30. After arriving at Wallaceburg, Rankin and
Jackson, along with two other men,
one of whom was Tom Martin, left
the car platform intending to go to
the sugar beet factory. On arriving
at the factory they missed Rankin,
whom they thought was following
behind all the time.

"The next trace which we found of him," said Mr. Anderton, was at Mike O'Mara's, where he was last seen by Mr. O'Mara between seven and eight o'clock, Mr. O'Mara told him that it was the mr. O'Mara told him that it was the mr. him that it was time he was getting his supper, and advised him to go over to Mr. Fryer's restaurant. Ran-kin left the hotel, and it was sup-po ed that he was going to the reskin left the hotel, and it was supposed that he was going to the restaurant, which is just at the approach to the bridge. However, when we saw Mrs. Fryer she said that she did not remember seeing Rankin in the restaurant on the evening in question. Mr. O'Marawas positively the last man who was sure he saw the missing man. "We afterwards dragged the river from O'Mara's to the Pere Marquette bridge, but no trace was found of anything that would indicate that Rankin fell in the river. Rankin wore a tap on the day of his disappearance, "We grappled all day Sanday between John O'Mara's and the bridge, and we broke all the ice in the vicinity, and I think we covered the ground pretty thoroughly. The river is now filled with drift ice, and the search had to be discontinued. There is a very strong current in There is a very strong current in the Sydenham, and the river has a tendency to wash everything to the sides. While we were grappling, I noticed that the centre of the stream was clear of logs and drift-wood, while ap near the shore the bottom was covered with debris in places. "The report that Rankin had a large sum of money on him is all wrongs. On the day of his disappeanance he had about \$35. He had about \$7 or \$8 in his pockets before he left home, and he afterwards got a cheque for \$27."
