To-night's Recital.

A recital is to be given in College Hall this evening by Miss Mary Genevieve Brady, a Kings county young lady who has taken a course at the Emerson School of Oratory, Boston, and has won remarkable success as a reader. All those who are interested in the success of local talent should attend. The following clipping should be a sufficient guarantee as to the qualification of the reader:

A delightful recital was given in St. Andrew's church last Tuesday evening by Miss Mary Genevieve Brady, assisted by Mrs Laura Mellen Richardson, pianist, and Miss Fannie Stevens, soprano. Miss Brady is a reader whose commanding stage presence and artistic abilities cannot but gain for her many admirers. She wins her audience before uttering a word, by her charming grace and fascinating individuality. Her selections on Tuesday evening were of a widely varied nature, but Miss Brady was wholly equal to the demands. An occasional lack of spontaneity, and hurried articulation was perhaps due to nervousness, but added practice and experience will easily master these faults. Further developments on her present line of work should win for her many laurels.

Miss Brady's opening selections were "Advice" and "Two Glasses." Then came "How we Hunted a Mouse," in which the rich humor was brought out most contentiously. "How Salvator Was," was excellently rendered and the beautiful word pictures and delicate pathos of Bryant's "Waiting by the Gate" were most effectively presented. If one were to single out any selection, however, as meriting special praise, the choice would fall to the closing "Spartacus" to the Gladiators at Capua's Kollog. Miss Brady's dignity and deep rich voice, were especially well suited to this selection, and her earnestness imbued it with a delightful impressiveness. All of her numbers were heartily enjoyed, and she responded with well chosen, and well rendered selections. Miss Brady was also the recipient of a handsome floral offering.—Boston Sunday Times.

Among the Horsemen. Mr R. M. Rand, Camard, has some promising stock in his stables. Mr R. is a very pleasant man to call on, and it is a pleasure for him to show you through his commodious barns. Entering the stable we were first shown a three-year-old filly, by "Ajalon," dam "Hurricane"—a thoroughbred mare, known as the "Wickwire mare." In the next stall is a filly same age by "Allie Clay," dam by "Rampart." She is standard. In the third stall is a two-year-old "Rampart, Jr." colt; he is a lofty, good looking. The fourth is a "Melbourne King" mare that had for her dam an "Albright." Then we come to a little black gelding by "Allie Clay, Jr."

Mr R. then leads the way to the next stable, and there we see a beautiful bay horse, sleek as a mole, and shines like a glass bottle. He is five-years-old this spring. Was sired by "Allie Clay, Jr.," and had the old thoroughbred mare for a dam. We then take a look in another box and see two well bred yearlings. To finish up we are shown a brood mare by "Rampart," out of the old mare, and now in foal to "Ajalon."
