Continued from Page 1. during the month, that which occurred at the evaporator. It had been found that some new equipment was necessary and the chief had been authorized to procure same. The fire hose was in bad condition, he said, and the chief wanted 500 feet of new hose. Mr. Sherwood thought the matter should be discussed by the Council before the hose was ordered. Coun. Harris reported for the Finance Committee that the receipts for the month of November were \$598.97, and the disbursements, \$4383.72. The debit bank balance on December 1st was \$5017.27. A number of bills were read and ordered paid.
