NEW YORK, March 31—About 100,000 union miners and 100,000 non-union miners quit work to-night in the bituminous and anthracite coal fields to enforce the new wage contracts.

In yesterday's report an amount of \$30 voted the Methodist Orphanage was inadvertently omitted from the Financial Committee's recommendations.

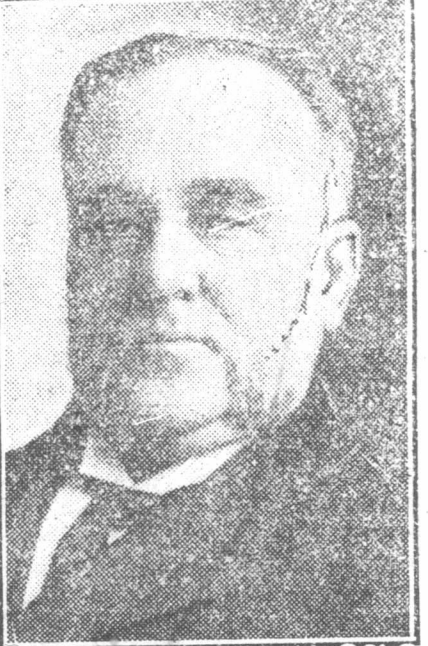
Held Up Train

Reduction In Canadian Revenue

OTTAWA, March 31—The total Canadian customs and excise revenue for the fiscal year ending to-day was \$229,500,274, compared with \$294,407,568 for the previous year, being a decrease of over sixty-four millions.

A Year's Fatalities

OTTAWA, March 31—Fifty-one military passengers were carried on Canadian railways last year. Four were killed and 240 injured. The total railway employees were 187,177, and ninety of these were killed and 1,344 injured.

Insurgents Attack Ship

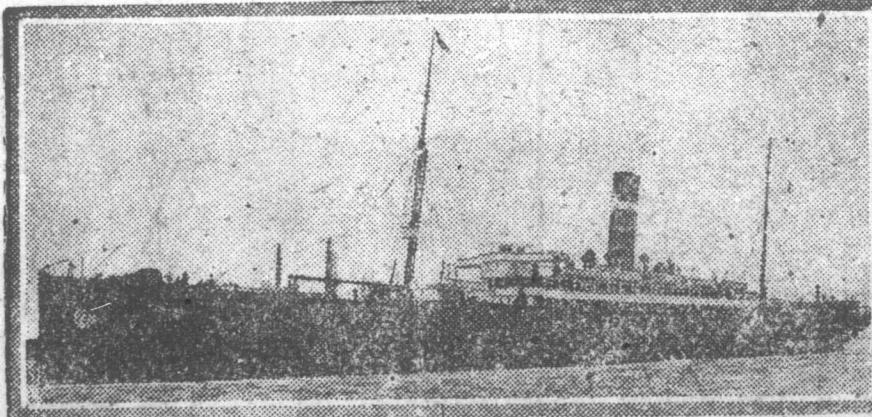

LONDON, April 1—Hope tempered with doubt and fear is the keynote of the morning newspaper editorial comment on the outlook in Ireland. The Daily Mail sees indications that Mr. DeValera is meditating coup d'etat and calls upon Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins to show their strength, declaring if they fail to govern, DeValera will make short work of them. The Daily Chronicle sees Mr. DeValera working toward military dictatorship. "In a struggle of that kind one feature of the comment is the universal tribute to the statement of Mr. Churchill, who earns the highest praise even from political opponents.

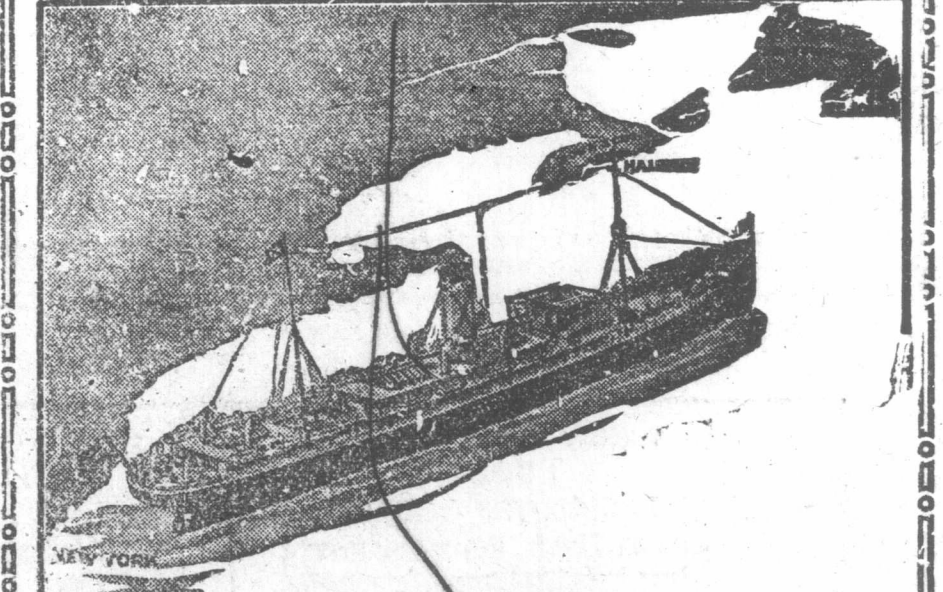
