Washington, Dec. 31,-The war in \$382,831,172 in decreased exports up to December 1, according to a statement issued today by the departcountries for the eleven months period ending with November aggregated \$1,867,991,492 against \$2.250.822.-664 for the same period in 1913. Despite the showing, however, the November trade balance in favor of the United States was \$69,411,271 and for the 11 months period \$193,372,036.

The most striking demonstration of the effect of the war shown by the statement is the decrease of Germany's \$48,072,784 1 consumption in November 1913 to \$42,136 in November this year. For Belgium the decrease was from \$3,999,169 in 19:3 to .
