## Engineers Turned Moose Hunters.

WONDERFUL LUCK FOR THIS SEASON OF THE YEAR.

The express train between Eel River and Dalhousie Junction early Saturday morning struck and killed a large moose, which was running ahead of the engine, evidently bewildered by the head-light. The same night about three miles west of Petit Rocher considerable excitement was manifested when train number 40 had the following luck. Engineer Williamson while gazing ahead saw on the track a moose which would not get out of the way until the engine struck and threw him clear of the rails, breaking the two hind legs. The engine then came to a stand still and the few passengers and trainmen alighted and Fireman O'Shaughnessy forgetting his railroad duties for the time being with the true aim of the best of those possessing sporting proclivities, stabbed the injured animal, bleeding him to death. Those who witnessed the death of the moose were very much amused. His carcass was then put on the train and brought into Newcastle, where those around the station carried him off piece-meal and thus ends the fortunate engine moose hunters tale. This moose had not shed his horns and was quite a curiosity for this season of the year.

## Another Shooting Scrape.

Conflicting stories are being circulated about a shooting affair which took place on Friday or Saturday over a fish net, the exact facts of which cannot be ascertained at the time of going to press. The all particulars of the shooting will appear in next week's edition. On Sunday evening, Deputy Sheriff Irving with a warrant created John Hare of Seaville and brought him to the County goal. Yesterday morning at eight o'clock the prisoner was taken before Police Magistrate John Niven on a charge of shooting at with intent to wound Fishery Officer Paul Kingston. W. Butler, Esq., appeared for defendant. The hearing was postponed until Monday, June 13, and will come up in the Police Court. The defendant in the meantime being admitted to bail.
