The trip to Redbank on the Steamer Rustler is growing in popularity as evidenced by the increasing numbers who take in that delightful sail every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon. The steamer leaves her wharf here at 2 o'clock and is usually back by eight o'clock and the fare is only 25c. Children half price.

The captain of the S.S. Triton, whose sailors were imprisoned for disturbing the peace last week paid their fines and had been released and taken on board the steamer but they managed to get away and are now supposed to be in hiding until the steamer leaves port. The work of putting a basin round the fountain in the Public Park which is being conducted under the supervision of Mr. George Brown whose son David C. of Aspen, Col., is the donor, made it necessary to raise the fountain about two feet higher which has been done and a handsome and most substantial foundation has been placed under it. Mr. Brown is a veteran builder and believes in thoroughness of construction and of everything, as has been exemplified by his insistence on completion of the contract for altering and repairing the Gun Shed for which work he was the inspector.

The Proposed New Pulp Mill.—Mr. R. A. Lawlor acting for the promoters, has given notice to the Governor and Council of intention to apply for a charter for the Miramichi Pulp and Lumber Manufacturing Co. Ltd. The capital is \$1,000,000. The incorporators named in the notice are Wm. Richards, Jas. Robinson, M. P. R. A. Murdoch, John Moravio and John Coleman. The works are to be built on the Morrison mill property.—World.

Dr. Smith of the Tracadie lazaretto was in Chatham last week in search of one or two cases of suspected leprosy. He succeeded in securing a boy who gave evidence of the disease being in his system and whose father is said to have died from its effects. The young patient was at once conveyed to his living tomb in the lazaretto. The circumstances gave rise to a story to the effect that the proprietor of a stage was a victim of the terrible disease and had been incarcerated by Dr. Smith.

Mr. F. E. Winslow as agent for the mortgages, the Royal Trust Company of Montreal, took possession of the Maritime Sulphite Co.'s works on Saturday.

The mortgage is for \$300,000, and was given to secure the payment of bonds issued by the company. Mr. Winslow paid the wages due, about \$9,000, taking from the men assessments of their claims, and kept the machinery at work on repairs that had been begun. It is likely that operations will soon be resumed under new management.

Writs of replevin have been issued for the purpose of trying to recover some lots of logs that have been delivered.—World.
