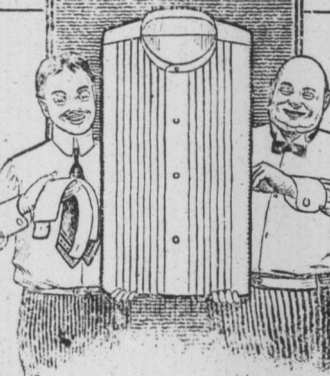

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A. & L. S. Railway Bill.

The 6 Months Hoist. Mr. Editor.—Your "special" of March 30 says: "This afternoon, when the bill of the Atlantic & Lake Superior Ry. was called, Mr. Marcil Mr. P. Mehan of the six months hoist seconded by Mr. Lemieux M. P. for Gaspe."

There must be a mistake. I read a report that the bill was introduced by Mr. Lemieux M. P. for Gaspe.

The Atlantic Quebec & Western Ry. or Short Line Railway Bill has been read a second time and referred to the Committee on Railways.

The Atlantic & Lake Superior Bill is expected to come up for second reading to-day or to-morrow.

So the bill was introduced and Mr. Marcil's hoist was intended to be dealt with the Short Line Bill and surely that is the action expected of it from him by every elector of Bonaventure.

I repeat there must be a misunderstanding somewhere.

Mr. Marcil has always favored the Gaspe and expressed his lack of confidence in those oil men and their Railway schemes.

He is not supposed to change when he has been generally approved chiefly for his constant advocacy of the Coast-Line.

Your "special" continues: "By this bill, the Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway ask for a revival of their powers from Gaspe to Sault Ste. Marie."

He will not meddle with the upper end of the road. Let the Government do what they think proper.

But we ask the Government to give the trustees the power to build to Gaspe and see that the subsidies given them are usefully spent and the laborers better paid on that section than they have been on the section from Matapedia to Paspébiac.

On the other hand, nobody in Bonaventure ever dreamt of asking the payment of debts due on the section of Matapedia to Paspébiac from any company authorized to build to Gaspe.

According to that principle the Atlantic Quebec & Western or its alter ego, the Petroleum Oil Trust must be obliged to give their financial statement and pay Bonaventure labor's claims and if they refuse Mr. Marcil is requested to move the six months hoist and Mr. Lemieux is expected to second the motion.

The trustees, your special says, have made no application themselves at Ottawa seeing they are not willing to do anything but build the old road.

It was worth the while to ask them. It was not likely Mr. Galinides would have crossed the Ocean and gone to Ottawa, if he was only willing to hold the road.

If the trustees make no application themselves it might be because they think the application must be made by the company whose road they have been put into possession, that is to say the A. & L. S. Ry. Company.

Would it not be sufficient to insert in the A. & L. S. Bill a clause giving the trustees the necessary powers to build the road to Gaspe?

Two years ago it was done for the section from New Carleton to Paspébiac, it might be repeated this year for the Section from Paspébiac to Gaspe.
