

THE BANK CRISIS. TROUBLE IN STATES ATTRACTING ATTENTION IN LONDON.

Belief That the U.S. Banks Are Sound-Cortelyou's Action Had Good Effect -Berlin Has Doubts That Other Banks May Be Doing an Unsafe Business.

London, Oct. 23.-The financial crisis in New York is attracting the greatest attention here. The financial editorial writers to-day are of the opinion that, although the effect will be felt here, it is not likely to be felt to any great extent, because British operators investors of recent months gradually have been freeing themselves from com-mitments and the influence of Wall

mitments and the influence of Wall street; consequently some sections of the stock exchange will not be very much influenced by the crisis.

The Morning Post believes that the financial troubles in America are accumulating too rapidly for temporary palliatives to have much effect, and it would be better for everyone concerned that the crisis should be hastened instead of delayed.

The Daily Mail in an editorial article

The Daily Mail, in an editorial article, reminds its readers that there is no need to suspect the sound American banks. This paper says there is a wide gulf between the conservative American banks and modern trust development. It is the speculators who are tumbling in the debacle, and their fall gradually is clearing the atmosphere.
