The Select General Committee of Delegates, in session for the last six days, have reported, and ANDREW STUART, Esq., of Quebec, ROBERT GILLESPIE, Esq., of London, and PATRICK MAXWELL STEWART, Esq., an active and intelligent member of the British Parliament, have been chosen as Agents to advocate their views and opinions before Parliament and the Ministry.

His Excellency Lord Gosford held a levee yesterday in the Government House, which was numerously attended. His Excellency appeared to be in high good humor. A guard of honor, and the band of the 2nd Regt., were in attendance in the court yard in front.

There are some questions of great local interest to the inhabitants of the City and District of Montreal, which we are fail to believe, have not been under or overlooked. There are others, amongst which may be ranked a Legislative union of the two Provinces, which must, or ought to have commanded a share of attention.

Circumstances of urgent necessity have induced the inhabitants of this city to regard the latter measure as one of paramount importance to the interests of the British population in the two Provinces. And believing, as we do, that any enactments of the British Parliament, directed to the redress of local grievances, would prove unsatisfactory and insufficient, unless accompanied by the steps of the two Provinces, we look with anxiety to the action of the Legislature.

The gentlemen subsequently appointed, in order to arrive at the desired object, viz.—the expenditures of all the monies received by the Company—found it necessary to make a set of books, which when taken up, present a comprehensive abstract of the whole transactions of the Company.

It is gratifying to learn that the inhabitants of New Brunswick are to lose no time in making the proper use of the £20,000 lately granted by Government for the purpose of effecting a complete survey of the St. Andrews and Quebec Railroad. A letter from Mr. Wilson, of St. Andrews, (N.B.) to Mr. AULD, of this city, explanatory of the steps the Railway Committee are about to take is subjoined—

Mr. AULD, June 14, 1836.
Sir:—Will you be so kind as to receive my respects, and to inform me whether the expenditure of all the monies received by the Company—found it necessary to make a set of books, which when taken up, present a comprehensive abstract of the whole transactions of the Company.
