On Sunday the 6th inst. after a short and severe illness, which she bore with the most Christian resignation to the Divine Will, ELIZABETH, relict of the late DONALD STEWART, Esquire, aged 71 years and 10 months, leaving a large family and circle of friends to mourn her loss.  
At Charlottetown, on Thursday last, at 12 o'clock, WILLIAM FORTNEY, the youngest son of W. W. FORTNEY, Esq. of Bonshaw, aged 19 months and 15 days.  
At the Manse of Berners, N. B. on the 26th June last, the Rev. John Bethune, Minister of Berners, in the 59th year of his age, and 31st of his Ministry.  
On the 15th inst. at North Point, Veron River, from the effect of a wound received on the head by the falling of one of the poles of a triangle, used in drawing a pump out of a well, on the premises of his brother Donald, who was also severely hurt, JOHN M'DONALD, aged 38 years, much respected and regretted by a large circle of friends and neighbours, leaving a disconsolate widow and five children to deplore their loss. He lived about 12 hours after being wounded.

A body, supposed to be that of an American fisherman, was discovered to be lying on the beach at New London, on Friday, the 14th inst., it was immediately taken charge of by James Campbell, Esq., and conveyed to a house, and as soon as a coffin could be prepared, he was interred in the nearest church-yard. But what his name was, or to what vessel he belonged, remains unknown. The fish was entirely off his head and face, so that nothing remained but the bare skull, his hands were also off by the wrists. His dress consisted of a blue shirt, jacket, waistcoat and trousers, of blue pilot cloth, a suit of old clothes and a pair of American made boots. There were no papers found, but on his right arm were two marks resembling a heart and a half-moon; he was about 6 feet high, and stout in proportion. He has indeed found a grave among strangers, but it may be a consolation to those who mourn his loss, that every act of kindness and sympathy which humanity could suggest, or the most affectionate friend desire, were performed for his mortal remains.
