New School for Indian Children at Redbank.
The Indian children at Redbank, who through lack of a schoolhouse have been deprived of schooling the past term, will soon have a new building of their own. Mr. Allan Tozer, of Sunny Corner has just completed a well constructed cosy little schoolhouse for the government on the river side of the road above Redbank, a short distance from the chapel and as soon as the seats required for the accommodation of the pupils are in place the little redskins take possession.

The building which is of frame, is 18 by 28 ft. in floor space and has three doors with covered entries, and eight windows, which will supply plenty of light. The inside is finished in Douglas fir, treated with raw and hard oils, and the floor is of hardwood. The trimmings on the outside have been painted and in the spring the entire outside will be given a proper dressing with paint. A bellry will also be erected in the spring. Over the front door a neat sign has been placed, reading: "Redbank Day School, N. B. 1916."

About fifteen Indian children will attend the school of which the teacher is Miss Cormier of Buctouche, who has taught the school several terms in a very satisfactory manner.

COLONIAL PREMIERS TO BE CONSULTED.
London, Dec. 26.—The premiers of Great Britain's colonies have been urged to attend at an early date—not later than the end of February—a series of special meetings of the war cabinet. At these meetings, says the British colonial secretary, "urgent questions affecting the prosecution of the war, possible conditions in which, in agreement with our allies, we could assent to its termination and problems which would then immediately arise" are to be discussed.
