WANTS HUNS TO PAY ENTIRE COST OF WAR

Horatio Bottomley Moves to Force Germany to Put the Whole Shot.

London, May 14 .- In the House of ommons, Mr. Horatio Bottomley has given notice of motion, declaring that the peace treaty has not fulfilled the pledges of the British Ministers in regard to indemnities, and in view of the fact that the main financial burdom of the war has fallen on Great o the department of justice to see o Britain, no treaty is acceptable which does not provide for rendering to the enemy a hill for the entire cost of the war, and arranging for the recovery of such cost regardless of the period over which it may be necessary to extend the payment.

Replying to a question by Mr. Botomley as to cash payments as detailed in the peace treaty, Mr. Bonar Law pointed out that bonds for five billion pounds sterling were deliverable as an account of total obligations, but further issues of bonds might be required subsequently as security. The amount payable either in money or otherwise was not limited to the amount of the bonds, but must meet in full all the demands specified in section 3 of the official summary. GERMANY'S IDEA OF WHAT A LEAGUE OF NATIONS SHOULD BE

Paris, May. 14.—The German plan for 3 League of Nations submitted ed by the Garman delegation at Versailles, and now in the hands of the Feace Conference Committee on the League of Nations, to which it was referred, contains sixty six articles, together with a supplement setting forth the charter for an International Labor League. The special aims of the League of Nations davised by the Germans are set forth as follows:

(A) Prevention of international disputes. (B) Disarmament.

(C) Securing freedom of traffic and general economic equality of rights (D) Protection of national minorities.

(E) Creation of an international workers' charter.

(F) Regulation of colonial questions. (G) Unity of existing and future international institutions.

(H) The creation of a Parliament.

Another provision of the draft reads: The League of Nations shall comprise: (A) All belligerent States tak-

ng part in the present war; (B) All neutral States included in The Hague Arbitration Lague; (C) All others to be admitted by vote of two thirds of the existing members. Entrance is reserved to the Holy See.

FORMER AUSTRIAN EMPEROR WILL NOT BE PLACED

ON TRIAL Paris, May 14.—The Austrian treaty is stated to be nearly complete. While the details of it have not become known, it is asserted that in some respects it will follow the German document. This is true especially as regards trial by court martial of persons responsible for violation of the rules of warfare during the period of hostilities, although it is stated no demand is to be made for the trial of former Emperor Chares by an international civil tribunal. The delimitation of the boundaries of Austria will follow the lines laid down in the treaty of London.

GERMAN DEMOCRATS MAY WITHDRAW

Paris, May 14.-The heads of the two German Democratis parties and the parties of the Centre have informed Chancellor Scheideman that their parties will withdraw their representatives from the Government in case the Cabinet decides to sign the peace treaty, according to a despatch from Berlin received here by way of Basle.
