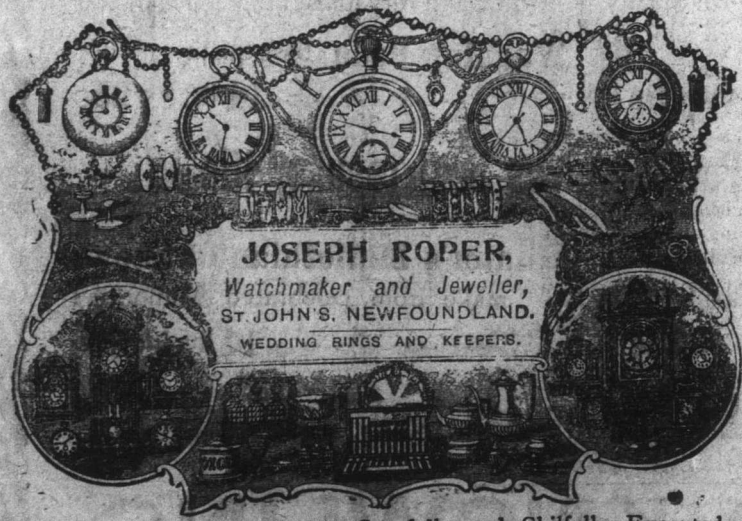

## BOARD OF TRADE.

### Interim Report.

The Council of the Board of Trade in presenting the second interim report, desire to say that they could not hold a meeting in the summer owing to the absence of so many members of the Board from the city at the time when the meeting should have been held.

**TRAWLING ON THE LABRADOR.**  
This matter has received the very earnest attention of the Council during the past six months, and a set of resolutions on the matter were recommended by the Council to the Department of Marine and Fisheries last April.

It is deplorable that the Labrador fishery for traps has been of such a disappointing character this year, but it has served the very useful purpose of impressing the correctness of the Board's position in regard to the use of trawls in the catching of fish on the Labrador coast. The Council are strongly of opinion that trawling should be regulated so as not to interfere with those using traps or other similar means of taking fish, but at the same time they are of equally strong opinion that it is a very grave mistake to prohibit the use of trawls, which is the most economical method of fishing, and produces the best grade of fish.

The Council recognize that trawling necessitates an adequate bait supply, and this is a question which they feel should be dealt with in a very determined and thorough manner, and exhaustive experiments should be made with dried squid to determine its relative usefulness and cost as compared with other bait fishes.

As to whether it is best to establish stations for the storage of frozen squid on various parts of the Labrador, or to employ a sailing vessel as a storage refrigerator which could move from one part of the coast to another as the condition of the fishery might require, and which could be equally as well supplied as the shore refrigerators by one or more small steamers carrying bait from one part or another of the coast as obtainable, is a question upon which there may be considerable difference of opinion, but certainly the method of using a sailing vessel as a storage chamber should be more economical. Some very fine vessels well suited for this purpose have during the last two years been sold in England at not over \$8,000 per ton.

Regarding the taking of squid, the Council are of opinion that some wise regulations should be made to enable the fishermen within certain limitations to catch what is necessary as bait with nets or seine.

One of the limitations they suggest is that squid should not be taken for use for manure in any form.

It is hoped that the attention the Council has given to this matter will bear fruit, and the object lesson which the Council has received this year will result in regulations being made that will permit the use of trawls on the Labrador.

The Council regret that they have been unable to obtain satisfactory statistics of the fishery, and it is quite obvious that unless statistics can be obtained that the marketing of fish must always be under a serious disadvantage. The efforts which have been made by the Government to obtain satisfactory statistics for the use of the Board seem to have failed in several respects, and the Council are of opinion that this dereliction of duty will have to be dealt with in a very severe manner if the statistics which we are anxious to obtain, and the Government are anxious to supply, are to be obtained.

The Council are very pleased to note that the steamship services between Montreal, New York and St. John's have been very much improved, and they believe that next year with the possible advent of a new steamer, an improvement on the a.s. service, that the service will be even better, and will result in a still larger number of tourists availing themselves of our beautiful summer climate, affording as it does a splendid relief from the heat of the summer months in the States.

Mr. A. B. Dallas, who was appointed as agent for the Board to endeavor to open new markets in the southern portion of Brazil and South America, has completed his journey and service to the Board. There appears to be a considerable quantity of fish used in the various places, but it comes mainly from Scotland and Norway, and is cured in a style entirely different from our own, being made extremely white and hard, and while it appears to be of an inferior edible quality and almost tasteless, the cure of the fish we now export would appear to be too soft to stand the climate, and meet the requirements of the people in South America, so that unless we can alter the method of curing of fish there is very little hope of extending our markets in the territory which Mr. Dallas has visited.

An extended report of Mr. Dallas' work is being prepared, and it will be open for inspection of any member

of the Board on application to the Secretary.

It is with extreme regret that the Council learned through a cable received by Mr. Charles Duder that Mr. A. B. Dallas died suddenly from heart disease at Pernambuco on the 5th instant.

Mr. George Hawes of Malaga has been appointed agent for the Board of Trade in Spain for a period of two years, and any member of the Board desiring to communicate with him will please do so through the Secretary. Mr. Hawes was here last June, and during his visit he repeatedly impressed upon the exporters of fish the great need of an improvement in the cure of fish, and he pointed out that while the French and Norwegian were making rapid strides in the cure of fish, we were retrograding, and that it was not so much a question of obtaining new markets as retaining our old ones, and he gave it as his firm conviction that we would certainly be driven out of our present markets in Spain by the French and Norwegian unless we at once and seriously attend to the improvement of the cure.

Mr. John Rendell, who has been agent for Messrs. Job Bros. & Co., Ltd., and Messrs. Bowring Bros., Ltd., in Spain and Italy for quite a number of years, also favored the Secretary with an interview, and he most emphatically pointed out the same features of the cure of fish as Mr. Hawes had already so repeatedly emphasized. In this connection a circular is in preparation for distribution amongst the fishermen of the Colony, and it is to be hoped that they will receive the suggestion in a kind spirit, and they are intended solely to benefit the individual fisherman and the Colony at large.

The question of "dun" on fish has received the consideration of the Council, and they are of opinion that the gentlemen who helped to furnish us with literature bearing on the matter, notably Capt. Solling and His Britannic Majesty's Consul at Copenhagen, from whom copies of the exhaustive reports of the Norwegian Government in their examination into the origin and cure of this evil were received. The Council are of opinion that further investigation should be made and are taking steps to obtain information to that end.

### TELEPHONES.

The Council has had this matter continually before them, and they have had some communications from the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, in which has resulted in nothing of a definite character.

Upon return of the Premier from the Hague the Council appointed a delegation, consisting of the President, Vice-President and Secretary, to wait upon him in reference to the matter. They were received in a very frank and cordial manner, and were informed that the proposals had been made from the Anglo-American Telegraph Company to the Government with a view to the installation of a thoroughly up to date system of telephones, and that the representatives were at present considering the operation of a Government system in connection with our Postal Telegraphs.

The Council, however, after many months of deliberation and considering all the advantages of a telephone operated by an independent company, are unanimously of the opinion that the city and Colony would be best served if the Government were to take it up themselves and install a thoroughly up to date system, having greater facilities for the reception of the small charge as against telegrams, and at the same time benefiting the Postal Telegraphs by reducing the expenditure for maintenance of unremunerative offices, of which there may be quite a number in the Colony at the present moment.

From the expressions of opinion from various members of the Board, they feel confident in assuring the Government of the hearty co-operation and support of the mercantile community to an up to date system of telephones to be installed by the Government, and they venture to hope that the Government will give this aspect of the question their favorable and preferential consideration. The eagerness with which several foreign companies have manifested to obtain a charter is sufficient evidence that the venture as a commercial undertaking would be highly profitable. The telephones system seems to have gone from bad to worse and grave inconvenience is experienced by all users of it, as it is a very easy thing at almost any hour of the day to listen to other people's business over the telephone from transmitting any

messages of a confidential character.

The Council note with much satisfaction the action which the Government have taken for the erection of Marconi stations on the Labrador, and they suggest that a station should be erected at a suitable place for connection with the sealing steamers.

The Council appointed a sub-committee to consider the question of sending parcels through the post C.O.D., and afterwards a deputation waited on the Post Master General and laid the views of the Council on this matter before him. Mr. Woods pointed out that already there were about 68,000 packages going through parcel post, and he informed us that the Government had the matter of sending parcels C.O.D. under their consideration, but as the principal did not seem to be adopted anywhere else, for these, and other reasons, he did not think that anything could be done in this matter at present.

The Council take this opportunity of saying that the retail trade in St. John's have much desired that this matter should take effect, and they think that by doing the usefulness of the Post Office would be much greater, and that its income would be improved, and that the local trade would generally benefit by such an arrangement.

A committee was appointed to consider a publication of a Bill of Entry on the same lines as the one published in Liverpool, England, and the matter was laid before the Government, who met the Council in a very fair spirit, and the result was the publication of a Bill of Entry as it appears in the Evening Chronicle, but the committee feels that this falls very far short of the requirements of the trade, and that unless the Bill of Entry can be published in the form of a separate paper, it may be advisable to discontinue it.

A committee is now sitting to consider the Peddler Licenses. The Manufacturers' Association which was incorporated with the Board of Trade some time ago intend holding an exhibition in the Prince's Park to be opened on the 31st of October, and closed on the 5th of November. It is to be hoped that by bowing to the buying public of Newfoundland the product of our factories that our home trade will be largely increased, and as the exhibition will run concurrently with that of the agricultural it is anticipated that it will be a marked success.

The keen interest which the Government are showing in the promotion of Agriculture, and the excellent lectures which have been delivered the last year by Dr. Robertson and others meet with the hearty approval of the Council, and they believe that the Government have made a very wise move in holding an Exhibition of Agricultural product this year, as it cannot all to stimulate greater interest in Agriculture throughout the colony, as well as being a source of practical instruction to all who will be fortunate enough to attend.

Several firms have now availed to a large extent of the Board of Trade inspection when shipping cask fish, and the Council hope that the time is not very far distant when the exporters of all fish (including bulk argosies) will be compelled to ship under the supervision of the Board of Trade's Inspector.

Owing to the numerous complaints which have been made during the last two years of the quantity and quality of Lingon berries shipped from Newfoundland, the exporters of these berries have requested the Board of Trade to undertake their inspection. This is being done in a very thorough manner under the supervision of the Board of Trade's Inspector, and there is every reason to hope that they will be successful in establishing a good reputation for this product of the colony.

This being the first meeting of the Board since the sad event the Council wish to express their profound regret and sympathy with those that have been bereaved by the death of His Late Majesty King Edward VII.
