A Strange Piece of Japanese Though

Man Who Killed Brother Suffering From Cancer, at Latter's Request is is Sentenced to Two Years In. prisonment.

Tokio, July 4 .- Killing his brothe eccause he loved him well is the gist of a police case concluded here which casts a curious light on Japanese habits of thoughts. Mutsu Kato, the murderer-by-request, has been practically freed by the district judge, and the Tokio press is unanimous in praise of

his verdict. Mutsu Kato and his brother. Kato, were twins and loved each other with an affection rare even among the Japanese. When Sura became stricken with cancer of the stomach he asked his brother to kill him pleading that to be despatched thus by a loving hand would be the greatest pleasure he could enjoy. For days Mutsu refused the strange request, but finally consented, and after a heartrending parting, slew his brother with sword. Immediately afterwards the

slayer reported the whole matter When brought to trial the execution er, through love, wept bitterly. He was sentenced to two years' imprisonment, but the execution of the sentence was postponed by the Judge for three years, this being tantamount a cancellation of the punishment. The trial was a record, no manslaughter case under similiar circumstances ever having been tried in Japan.
