DIAS DEAD.

PARIS, To-day. General Porfirio Diaz, former President of Mexico, died this morning. Diaz had been failing in health since reaching Europe in 1911 after his resignation from the Presidency of Mexico, following the successful Madero revolution.

KING GEORGE'S GIFT.

WASHINGTON, To-day. A gold vase standing more than two feet high, the gift of King George to the yachtmen of America, was received at the British Embassy here to-day from London and forwarded to the Panama Pacific Exposition, where it will be one of the prizes of the aquatic contests. It is inscribed, "Presented by King George V. to the Panama Pacific International Exposition Regatta, 1915."

KILLED OFFICERS.

LONDON, To-day. The killing of a Major, Captain, Lieutenant, and Sergeant, and the wounding of a Captain and Sergeant, all officers of the Eighth Indian Cavalry, by two fanatic Mohammedans, who were subsequently shot to death, was announced to-night by the British Official Press Bureau. The two men are reported to have been of morose and fanatical dispositions. The Eighth Indian Cavalry is stationed in India.

MUNITIONS BILL PASSED LORDS.

LONDON, To-day. Lord Curzon, speaking in the House, said that at present the situation was one of grave anxiety, and it was not too much to say the country was in great peril. Events and a recent statement removed the scales from everyone's eyes. This was not the time, he said, for a critical or censorious attitude, but the time to pass the bill which would enable the organization of a rapid supply of munitions to go ahead and make up any way. After a few remarks had been made by Baron Weyland, who criticized the remissness of the late Government and placed the responsibility upon Premier Asquith, the Munitions Bill passed in both Houses.

THE LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day. A sudden recurrence of heavy artillery fire by Germans at many points in France, was the marked feature of the fighting at the Western front, but meantime the Austro-German advance in Galicia and Poland is unchecked. The Germans have shown no disposition to diminish the intensity of their Eastern offensive. The Polish fortress of Zamosc has been captured and progress in other sectors of strategic importance in the East is claimed by Berlin. There has been during the week no official news whatever from the British front in Flanders, but General Sir Ian Hamilton, commanding the Allied land forces in the Dardanelles, in his second official despatch of the week, records the repulse of a vicious counter-attack by Turks, who were bent on recovering lost ground south of the fortified hill of Achi Baba, and the strong position at Krithia, which the British have for some time been attempting to capture. The British forced a bit forward last Monday, the following day the Turks, after sapping and mining, launched a counter-attack with the bayonet. This was crushed while French forces operating on the right of Kereves Dere Valley toward the East coast of Gallipoli, advanced and consolidated the ground won in the latter part of June. Despite hard fighting ever since the landing on April 25th, the Franco-British expedition has only lately achieved anything notable towards strengthening its hold on the tip of the Gallipoli Peninsula. Achi Baba being a small Gibraltar bristling with machine guns and surrounded by barbed wire and terraced with trenches. This is the reason why the Allied progress was halted with great satisfaction.

VILLAGE OF TOLMINO OCCUPIED.

PARIS, To-day. The Italians have occupied the village of Tolmino, on the Isonzo, north of Gorizia, according to a Rome despatch. The Austrians are still holding the neighboring fortifications, and are bombarding the village. Italian heavy artillery has been brought up and mounted for use against the forts. Tolmino, the key to the Isonzo Valley, has been considered by the Italians indispensable (?) in their operations in that district. It is protected by strong natural and artificial defenses and is said to have been garrisoned by thirty thousand Austrians.

ANOTHER PROTEST.

LONDON, To-day. A Stockholm despatch states that the Swedish Minister to Petrograd has been instructed to protest against Swedish neutrality being involved by Russian warships firing on German warships within Swedish territorial waters.

TEN DROWNED.

LONDON, To-day. The Amsterdam correspondent of the Morning Post, sends the following: Ten of the crew of twenty men were drowned when the Dutch lugger Kalwik 147, struck a mine in the North Sea.

THE 'TIMES' AND THE ALLIES' STRATEGY.

LONDON, To-day. The military correspondent of the 'Times' refers to a suggestion in the Russian army organ, the Busky Invalid, that Austro-Germans lately have gained marked advantage owing to the unity of their plans and actions, and that it might be advisable for the Entente Allies to co-ordinate their operations and subordinate them to some central authority in whose ability everyone would have equal faith. The correspondent considers that there is something wanting in the Allies' strategy. He suggests that, though it would be impracticable for a central authority to issue explicit orders to all Allies' forces, there might be frequent conferences to insure better touch between all the directions of the staffs of the army and navy, and that such conferences might be held alternately in capitals of the various allies.

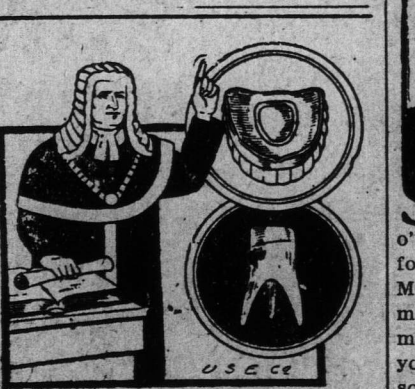

WAR DECEITS—AN INVENTOR'S UNIFORM AND SENTENCE.

(Daily Mail, June 7.)

Various criminal courts dealt on Saturday with persons—men and women—who were accused of deceitful acts or false pretences in connection with the war.

The inventor of an aerial torpedo, Alfred Rutt, thirty-five, describing himself as an engineer, was charged before Mr. Francis at Westminster, under the Defence of the Realm Act with wearing a uniform like that of a naval officer, calculated to deceive. Mr. Isaac Francis Towing, an underwriter at Lloyd's, residing at Purley, said he had known the defendant since last October and had agreed to finance his aerial torpedo invention. He regarded the uniform as much the same as recognized by Lloyd's for their signaller.

Major Olive Miller, of the Royal Flying Corps, said he thought at the first the uniform was that of a naval lieutenant. In cross-examination he said there had been interviews and correspondence by the defendant with the War Office over the aerial torpedo, and that the official permit was given to the defendant to allow him to demonstrate the machine in action. The defendant, giving evidence, said he had made a practical test of 105 miles an hour speed and been up to a height of 2,000 feet. By his dress he simply wanted to be regarded as an engineer.

Mr. Francis said he must class the prisoner as a person who had committed a serious and dangerous offence in masquerading for his own purposes as an officer of His Majesty's Navy. He would be sentenced to six months' imprisonment in the second division. Mr. E. Wild, K.C., who, with Mr. Wallington, defended, gave notice of an appeal.
