HAD TASTE!

The other day I heard a man tell some people all about his troubles in a younger brother who was apparently fitted for nothing so much as for a cell in prison. The man described some of the young man's escapades and what a time the family had to save him from the consequences. He himself had lost several hundred dollars by him. The story was quite uncoloured. The people to whom he told it were not intimate but casual friends.

More Offensive Than Wrong. I had liked the man before he started telling that story. When he finished I felt a sort of aversion for him.

But why? Why shouldn't he say his brother was a crook when it was perfectly true and when he had suffered so much from him, I asked myself? And then myself answered, "It may not be wrong for him to say so but it is something more instinctively offensive than wrong, its bad taste." Queer how we feel about certain things, isn't it?

Such a breach of family loyalty is one such thing. He is Right But Our Sympathy Isn't With Him.

Another is any breach of courtesy to age even when age does not fully deserve courtesy. For instance, suppose a mother and daughter or father and son are arguing and suppose the older person is in the wrong and is very obtuse and obstinate, yet if the son pushes home his point with the

same force he would use toward someone of his own age, something in us shrinks. He is right, yes, but we don't like it. Our sympathies go out to his opponent. We don't want him to use all his force. He has a right to, but we don't want him to take advantage of that right.

Any breach of the obligations of hospitality, even when the guests have not lived up to his obligations as a guest, also offends some instinct within us. A guest may be selfish, critical, hard to please, may outstay his welcome, and yet if the host should tell him to go, while one would know with one's mind he was justified, some strange instinctive part of one would resent his act.

People Of The Best Breeding Cede Certain Rights.

It seems to me it all goes back to Phillips Brooks's sentence which I have so often quoted to you "We don't have a right to all our rights." There are some things which while they are not wrong, are in bad taste. One may have a right to do them but it has become a self imposed law of noblesse oblige among people with the highest breeding to cede certain rights and when people stand on their rights and refuse to cede them, it leaves a bad taste in our feeling towards those people.

Opening a Convent School at Bell Island.

On Saturday His Grace the Archbishop, accompanied by the Rev. Father Gough, of Portugal Cove, as Chaplain, went to Bell Island for the purpose of formally opening the new Convent Schools in that Parish which will be in charge of a Community of Sisters of the Mercy Order. Some days previously four Sisters of the Mercy Order who will form the Community of the new foundation went to the island to make arrangements for the opening of the schools. Some months ago the corner stone of the new Convent was laid and ever since that time the Pastor of the Parish, Rev. Father McGrath, had been making preparations for the coming of the Sisters, so as to enable them to commence their work at the beginning of the present term. The new Convent for the Sisters is at present in course of erection, and until its completion temporary arrangements have been made for the Sisters.

On Sunday a large congregation was present in the Parish Church, and during Mass Canata, which was sung by the Pastor, Father McGrath, the Archbishop addressed the people on the coming of the Sisters amongst them. He reminded them that more than two years ago, on the occasion of his first official visit, he had intimated that the time had come when some forward step should be made in educational matters in a Parish of the population and importance of Bell Island. On that occasion he had expressed the hope that in the not distant future the invaluable educational services of the Sisters of one of our teaching Orders would be placed at the disposal of the Parish. Some months ago he had come amongst them again for the purpose of laying the corner stone of the Convent, and he was there on the present occasion, he said, for the purpose of formally inaugurating their work and invoking the blessing of God on their mission in the Parish. At the time of the laying of the corner stone it was hoped that the building would be ready for occupancy before the end of the year, but owing to unavoidable delays, that had been found to be impossible. At the same time it was felt that the beginning of the work of the Sisters should not be any longer postponed, and, consequently, it was decided that the Sisters should open school at the beginning of the present term. With a view to this, he said, temporary arrangements had been made for the Sisters until such time
