Being a constant reader of your popular paper, I am always on the alert for anything of interest, and being a Trinitarian, those items "Trinity Day by Day" etc., by W.J.L., appeal to me very much, and often have I been tempted to write a note of appreciation to the writer through the columns of your paper. His interesting notes of to-day's issue have brought me to action, and I feel quite sure that every Trinitarian, and especially the many who are far away from the land of their birth, appreciate and eagerly look forward to any doing of yours in any way helpful to one of Nature's best.

Trinity, in the not far distance, possessed a newspaper—"The Trinity Enterprise"—but of late one has heard nothing whatever of its publication. Many say it is dead; however, let us hope it may soon come to life with renewed energy and become worthy of its name.

Were it not for such men who interest themselves as Rev. Canon Lockyer, many things would be forgotten. Trinitarians abroad and many people who are interested in the old town, would be delighted to have regular weekly readings through your paper, and we trust that our esteemed writer may be able to make the satisfactory arrangement.

It is a pleasure to note the coming of the modern motor boat for the South West Arm—surely a step in the right direction and not before it was needed. This with the dredging of the Bar, as W.J.L. has said, "would make the scheme well nigh perfect." If one remembers rightly something was promised to the people of Dunfield some few years ago re the dredging of the Bar. Those who know realize what a benefit this would mean to the fishermen as well as to many others. It is to be hoped that some member of the Government may become interested.

We think that Trinity has made a very wise move in the amalgamation of the schools. This we know was talked of some long ago. We are glad to hear of it and trust that much good will result to all concerned.

One is also pleased to note the enterprising spirit of Mrs. John White to help overcome the boarding house problem. May she be well repaid for her labor.

This brings to one's mind the great lack of hotel accommodation in many of our outports, and draws attention to the following which appeared in one of the city papers some few years ago. For the benefit of any person who at this time may be trying to decide where to spend his or her vacation, I think it well worth repeating: "In the same proportion in which the housing problem affects the welfare of the citizen and the municipal life of St. John's, so the hotel problem affects the progress of the outports of the Island.

"The hundreds of tourists who annually visit Newfoundland, bitterly complain of the insufficiency of accommodation. Many of them leave to return no more owing to this great drawback.

"Had we, therefore, hotels in various parts of the country where natural attractions need no artificial efforts to enhance its beauty, it is safe to assume that these places would soon become chief resorts of the visitors. The northern bays sadly lack adequate hotel services.

"The town of Trinity is one of THE historic places in the Island. It is one of the most magnificent harbors in the world, and its beautiful scenery stands unrivalled even in a country famed for scenic beauty.

"Its deep arms carry one over a large sheet of smooth water, and at every bend and turn, around every headland and point, new and delightful views are presented.

"The roads are splendidly built, capable of running autos over anywhere in the vicinity. The followers of Walton have a paradise of sport in the ponds and rivers not far from the hotel, and partridge abound plentifully on the barrens within easy reach.

"The traveller, tourist, health-seeker and sport, will, therefore, find TRINITY an ideal spot."
