Captain Stephen Sluyter. The passage was a pleasant one of thirty hours, and when we entered the Bay, Sluyter kindly pointed out some of the mperia Jobacco Ca notable harbors on the route-Pinch Gut, Famish Gut, Haystack and Cock-Eye. Arrived at LaManche 8 p.m., and were boarded by 20 Cornish miners, in full forehead and sidelights and 13999992 giving off a full perfume of genuine Jamaica. In three weeks after, John RE RICE MA Murphy (Capt. John of Cape Race notoriety) had the branch line built and office in working order. Things worked very satisfactorily and checks were large. About 9 a.m. August 5th, 1858 three gents of the Cable Staff, -----Knight, Smythe and Hoye, arrived from Bay Bulls Arm, laden with telegrams, for the cable fleet had arriv-
