Besides Mr. Medcalf, there were in the field, Mr. James Stock, the Reform Candidate, and Mr. M. C. Cameron. Had Mr. Medcalf presided in running, as he solemnly declared he would Mr. Cameron would have been defeated, and Mr. Stock returned. This was not to be thought of, and means were adopted to get Mr. M. out of the way.

The Fenian Executions.

For once the sword of justice has leaped from its scabbard in England, unrestrained by the appeals of mercy, and three men who had been found guilty of murder, to which they had been prompted by their Fenian feelings or obligations, have swung from a Manchester scaffold, a warning to those who might be tempted to imitate their crime. In the eyes of those who judge calmly, Allen, Larken and Gould will be considered as having richly merited their fate; but the mistaken ideas of many of their countrymen will invest them with the crown of martyrdom. In examining the conduct of those who have lately stood in British courts charged with being parties to Fenian outrages and consequent loss of life, one cannot help being struck with the desire which they evince to walk in the footsteps of the brilliant but misguided visionary Emmett. They make him their prototype, and when asked what they have to say why sentence of death should not be pronounced against them, they all make speeches, imitative of his matchless death speech, as nearly as they possibly can permit them to approach. This was particularly observable in the case of Burk, who was tried in Ireland, and whose speech when Chief Justice Whiteside put the usual question to him was a feeble, hobbling parody on that which Emmett addressed to Lord Norbury, and which will stand while stands the English language as one of the brightest jewels in the casket of impromptu orations.

THE GRAND TRUNK BILL.—We

learn from the London Daily News of the 7th instant, that the deputations appointed at the meeting of the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada, on the 31st ult., have had a conference with the directors, the result of which is, that as regards the bill to be presented to Parliament, all the clauses which objection was taken by the meeting are withdrawn. The powers of the bill are now confined to the raising of a sum not exceeding £500,000 in equipment mortgage bonds, No 2 (such bonds in no way to interfere with the priorities and rights of the existing equipment bonds), and to the enabling of variations being made in the terms of the agreements with the Buffalo and Lake Huron and Champlain Railways, with the consent of those respective companies.

SUNDAY LABOR.—The Montreal

Witness says:—If Sunday labor on any new enterprise is a bad omen, we fear for the prosperity of the New Dominion. One of the most important events in the history of Confederation, the signing of the Quebec scheme, is said to have occurred on Sunday, and now we learn that on Sunday morning 27th inst, Messrs Galt and Cartier proceeded by special train from Montreal to Ottawa, where a Cabinet meeting was held in the afternoon, and these two gentlemen returned again to Montreal by special train the same evening. "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it," and it is to be regretted that in the construction of a great political fabric, its builders should have thought proper to labor on the Sabbath day. Our statesmen should remember that they cannot transgress the Divine law with impunity.

LOOKING FOR PAP.—The London

Prototype has the following:—The Advertiser reports that Mr. Josiah Blackburn, of this city, is at Ottawa lobbying for the Queen's printer of Ontario, the work to be done at the office of his brother, Mr. John Blackburn, Toronto, and that he has secured a good number of promises of support. The fact is, somebody must have the job, and if the Messrs. Blackburn, ever on the alert for something in the shape of a government windfall, are poor and needy, and require such assistance, then by all means let them have it. Yet, at the same time, we cannot help thinking that the honors and emoluments of this office would be more deservedly bestowed on the proprietors of a journal that had shown a little more consistency in political matters than the Free Press proprietors have shown for years past. The public, however must not be surprised at what transpires in this age, where political tergiversation meets the same reward as the most straightforward consistency.

The Bible at the Paris Exposition.

The Rev. Newman Hall writes in the Christian World:—Just within the principal entrance from the Pont de Jena, which crosses the Seine, and at the right hand is what may be called the Evangelical Village, erected by special sanction of the Emperor. First, there is the Missionary Museum, where the missions of Great Britain, America, Paris, &c., exhibit the gods of the heathen, and other objects connected with Christian labors in idolatrous lands. Near to this, the Religious Tract Society have a building. Then you come to the Bible Society's House, always occupied by visitors. Mr. Hawke's Gospel stand is a circular building, with a number of open porches, in which are twelve persons, who speak fifteen different languages, and distribute gratuitously separate Gospels in French, German, Italian, Danish, Swedish, Dutch, Greek, Russian, Polish, Hebrew, Portuguese, Spanish, Arabic and Turkish. It is generally surrounded by eager groups, who thankfully receive the precious volume proffered. From April 1st to June 26th more than eight hundred thousand copies of separate books of the New Testament have been distributed. Upon Whit-Sunday alone, 34,000 Gospels were given away. Six hundred soldiers are daily marched into the Exhibition. These all receive a Gospel, and thus 25,000 soldiers and officers have already received the Word of God. Persons are seen daily sitting on the Boulevard and riding in the omnibuses reading these little books. For the small sum of fifty shillings, one thousand copies of Gospels can be provided. It is hoped that Christian people will not suffer the supply to cease so long as the Exhibition continues open, although I was told the stock was being rapidly exhausted. Last, not least, is the Salle Evangelique, where Protestant worship is carried on during the week. Such an opportunity of evangelizing France and Europe at so little cost of money and labor, was never yet afforded; for, instead of colporteurs going through Europe, Europe comes together in one place to receive the Word of God.—Evangelical Christendom, for August.
