PROTECTING AMERICAN FISHERIES.
The committee on foreign affairs in the United States Senate have decided to report against a bill which passed the House of Representatives recently, authorizing the President to send a war vessel to the Gulf of St. Lawrence to look after the interests of American fishermen. The committee do not think it necessary to take such action, and besides they do not want to give the President power to involve the country in war with Great Britain, which they conceive, the bill confers. Some of the papers complain that, because the President is personally and politically obnoxious to the Senate, he is deprived of the power of protecting American interests. But it is time enough to send war vessels to the fisheries when injustice is being done to those interests.
SOMETHING TO ENVY.—The London Advertiser says:—We have received a private note from the Rev. R. Balgarnie, who, in company with the Rev. Newman Hall, visited London last year. From it we venture to cull the following paragraph: "For two hundred years we (English Independents) have stood in the shade uttering our silent protest against the unscripturalness of a State Church, but we are emerging now into the light. The State Church in Ireland is doomed, and in England its dignitaries read in this the doom of the English State Church. Not that I have any reason to think the Episcopalian Church will go down, but rather that it will spring up into new life and vigor when the state fetters are struck off. That will indeed be a bright day for religious life in England when there shall be no dominant sect and all shall be equal. How we envy you Canadians the religious equality which you enjoy! Our educational views, as a denomination, has entered upon a new phase, but they have had scarcely time yet to consolidate. However, they have very much the complexion of the views which you have long held and practised. We envy you your educational system, with its attendant advantages! The parent state has much to learn from her colonial children."
INAUGURATION OF THE STATUE OF LUTHER.—The statue of Martin Luther was inaugurated on Thursday last in the presence of a vast concourse of people from all parts of Europe and America. The King of Prussia and the Crown Prince witnessed the scene. When the statue was unveiled salvos of artillery were fired, and as soon as the applause of the people had subsided, a hymn was sung by several thousand voices, with immense effect.
Strong pressure is brought to bear on Sir J. A. Macdonald to abandon the appointment of Mr. Howland. It is said that that was the object of Tom Fergusson's mission to Ottawa.
An incendiary fire was kindled in Glenallan on Thursday. The building burnt was an unoccupied frame dwelling house and was insured in the Waterloo Mutual for \$300.
