THE U. S. PRESBYTERIANS.

Proceedings of the General Assembly at Portland, Ore.

Rev. Dr. Briggs' Case Comes Up-Work of the Foreign Mission Board.

PORTLAND, Orc., May 27.—At Wednesday's session of the Presbyterian General Assembly the regular order of the day was foreign missions. The report says: The Board of Foreign Missions last year asked for \$1,000,000 and made its appropiation on the basis of \$1,000,000. The receipts amounted to over \$930,000. The board maintains 210 ordained American missionaries, 165 ordained and 255 licensed active workers. sustaining 284 churches with 30,aries, 165 ordained and 255 licensed active workers, sustaining 384 churches with 30,497 communicants. Additions to the mission churches have aggregated 3,430, lay workers number 1,494. Schools are also supported containing 29,000 pupils, with 167 candidates for the ministry. The contributions from native churches have amounted to nearly \$40,000. The missions of the heavy are located in fifteen different of the board are located in fifteen different countries.

As the directors of the Union Seminary express a desire to be honorably released from the compact of '70, the report suggests that it be allowed to withat without the compact, and, further, that draw from the compact, and, further, that a committee be appointed by the assembly to confer with all the theological seminaries, touching their views of the compact of '70 and any new compact that might be devised and to formulate a new compact with a view to happily uniting all the seminaries, the same to be submitted to the next general assembly.

After some debate it was decided to refer all the papers back to the committee of theological seminaries and that the committee immediately meet for consultation.

Love for the sheep marks the good shepherd; how much more should the good horseman love his horse for its use, its in-telligence, and the fondness it exhibits for telligence, and the fondness it exhibits for its owner, who sometimes little merits such affection. This noble animal deserves study of all concerned; there are so many things in regard to it that the study should be close and constant, as a matter of dollars, as well as of kindness and justice. By good treatment a horse will last 30 years in profitable use; therefore, when one is put under ground at the age of 15 the owner has lost the value of a new purchase. The foot is always to be studied with care; otherwise the shoeing cannot be properly done. "No foot, no horse," and the most trouble with horses is the injury to the feet done by bad shoeing. Every owner should mark his horse in some conspicuous way. This would do more to abolish horse-thieving than all the protective associations, good as these are in any neighborhood.
