The following were present: Mayor Taylor, Aldermen Wyatt, Heaman, Taylor, O'Meara, Moule, Wallace, Skinner, Jones, Carratt, Glass, Buyd, Dreaney, Anderson, Thomas, Fitzgerald and Shaw and Secretary Kingston.

Dear Sir: I have been instructed by Messrs.

Ald. Boyd supported the motion filing the communication. "We are elected by the people," he said, "and when we have committed any illegal act it will be time enough to threaten action against us."

Ald. Fitzgerald then put in his word in season. "It may not be generally known," he said, "that this Mr. Fraser is the solicitor of one of the companies which did not secure the sale of its plant. I do not see what No. 3 can do with the matter."

The motion referring it to No. 3 was then put and lost, Aldermen Heaman, O'Meara, Moule, Wallace, Skinner, Bartlett, Anderson and Shaw voting in the affirmative, with the remainder of the Council in the negative. The communication was then declared filed.

Ald Anderson said he was convinced that there was no way out of the difficulty but to support the plan of Ald. Taylor. The commissioners, he said, had not yet been consulted, and when the mistake was made it was not Commissioner Essery's duty to take any other stand than he had taken. It was not entirely the mistake of the Council, because they were not consulted in the matter as a body when the change was made.

Ald. O'Meara ridiculed the idea that the commissioners were ignorant of the fact that the change had been made in the amount of the debentures and announced himself as in favor of Ald. Tailor's scheme.

Under this head Ald. Thomas asked what had been done in connection with the securities and contract of the Ball Electric Light Company to sell their plant to the

city.

Ald, Boyd replied that the financial difficulty had not as yet been overcome. "If we cannot get the money" he said, "I don't see what can be done." It will be necessary to see the Water Commissioners and then No. 3 will take proper action.
