The Invitation to Premier Greenway.

With the object of inducing some of Its kicking supporters to vote for the second reading of the bill to coerce the Province of Manitoba, the Dominion Government has issued an invitation to Premier Greenway to come down to Ottawa to confer with it on the subject of the proposed legislation now before Parliament. This is a confession that the Administration at Ottawa sees that it cannot hope to pass its bill into law, and that even if it passed into law the measure could never be enforced to be of any advantage to the minority.

In the interests of peace, of good neighborhood, and of the country at large, it is to be regretted that the propriety of asking the Premier of Manitoba to confer with them did not occur to the men in power before they issued their blundering remedial order, from which all the mischief has arisen. When they sent that insolent demand to the Prairie Province, several byeelections were impending, and they hoped by this means to influence the electors to support their candidates. Hence the insane haste and foolish disregard for future consequences which characterized their actions. As Premier Fielding of Nova Scotia well put it in a public address the other day, if the members of the Ottawa Government intended to take action at all-if they were prepared to sit in judgment upwisdom of the proceedings of the Manitoba Legislature—surely they should have made full and careful inquiry into the matter. Did they do this? Not at all. In the most hurried manner after the judgment of the judicial Committee had been delivered they summoned the Manitoba Government to appear before the Government at Ottawa for the hearing of the minerity appeal. When the summons was issued the Premier of Manitoba, Mr. Greenway, was confined to his bed by sickness. The Legislature was The Attorney-General (Mr. Sifton) was leading the business of the Legislature and could not go to Ottawa. Delay was asked to enable these gentlemen to deal with the question. The delay was refused. The Government at Ottawa had evidently made up their minds without any inquiry and were determined to rush the matter through. There was some sort of nominal inquiry in which the Province had to be represented by a gentleman who was asked by telegraph to appear on its behalf. There was no investigation of the facts. When certain affidavits were presented on behalf of the minority, and time was asked to answer them, the affidavits were withdrawn and the case rushed on. The Government issued a remedial order and then flung the question into the arena of party politics and called on the Catholics of the country to support them on account of the issuing of that order. It is not surprising that the Province of Manitoba refused to obey an order issued under such circumstances. When we plead for a policy of conciliation we are sometimes told that Manitoba has refused conciliation. And then, after some further reference to the order, the Legislature of Manitoba proceeds to say:

"Nothing could be more unfortunate from the standpoint of the Roman Catholic people themselves than any hasty or peremptory ac-tion on the part of the Par-liament of Canada, because such action would probably produce strained relations, and tend to prevent the pos-sibility of restoring harmony. We respectfully suggest to your Excellency in council that all of the above considerations call most strongly for full and careful deliberation and for such a course of action as will avoid irritat-ing complications."

Thus Manitoba's plea for a full investigation into all the facts the men in power at Ottawa have entirely ignored. They have refused to withdraw the original obnoxious order on Manitoba, though almost the entire electorto the home has been substituted. ate of the Province, by their votes, have condemned it, and they are now forcing to a second reading a bill to coerce Manitoba, which, not being in accord with the original order issued to the Province, is held by the ablest lawyers in Canada to be unconstitutional, and therefore likely to land the country into no end of trouble and expense, while in no measure proving of service to the minority.

Turning to Premier Greenway for aid to get themselves out of the labyrynth of difficulties into which they have drifted, the incompetents at Ottawa plead that they really have not been in earnest-that they desire Premier Greenway to make promise that he will do "something," and thereby get them out of the slough into which they have tumbled. Premier Greenway's stand will not be changed. It has been consistent throughout. In it moderate men of every rank and condition can acquiesce. In effect Premier Greenway says, "Take back your illconsidered, strife-promoting, remedial order; agree to a full investigation into all the facts; and the Manitoba Legislature will redress any and every legitimate grievance then shown to exist." This proposition, which has the indorsation of Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, and, we believe, the large majority of the Canadian people, should be adopted at once. To gracefully accede to it would be to show statesmanship, even if the Ministers had to acknowledge that they had been led in the wrong path for a time. No other course that would be satisfactory to all parties is open to the Ministers at Ottawa. They cannot expect Premier Greenway to consent to any other expedient. It is the only fair, statesmanike method of removing the question from the Federal arena.

Trade Loyalty to Britain. Lord Salisbury, in a letter referred to in today's cablegrams, expresses his entire sympathy for any movement

having for its object the obtaining of a larger market in the colonies for British produce and manufactures. In this regard, the British Conservative leader and the Liberal party of Canada are thoroughly agreed. In order to promote the profitable interchange of products between Great Britain and Canada, the Liberals in the Canadian House of Commons unanimously supported the following resolution, which

was moved by Hon, L. H. Davies: "Inasmuch as Great Britain admits the products of Canada into her ports free of duty, this House is of the opinion that the present scale of duties exacted on goods mainly imported from Great Britain should be reduced."

Unfortunately, the men in power at Ottawa, having more regard for the combines than for the great mass of the people and for the promotion of trade with the motherland, ordered their followers to vote down the resotion, and thus it stands.
