—When to cut the corn for either silage or the old process of curing seems generally conceded to be at the glazing stage of the kernels. This condition occurs at a much earlier date than many suppose, and should be closely watched for. The grain does not improve by standing uncut longer, while the value of the fodder deteriorates rapidly. Nowhere does promptness pay better dividends than in cutting the corn on time.

on time.

—The New Zealand wheat crop this year shows a wonderful expansion as compared with last year. This year, throughout the colony, 402,273 acres of wheat were harvested, as compared with 301,400 and 1,201 an invesse of 100,810 acres. acres in 1891, an increase of 100,810 acres. The yield was estimated at 10,257,738 bushels, as compared with 5,723,610 bushels in the previous year. These figures show the large increase of 4,534,128 bushels upon the crop of the previous year, and will provide a large surplus for export.

Per Henry of the Wiscopsin export.

-Prof. Henry, of the Wisconsin experi-ment station, found, by thorough experi-ment, that of \$100 worth of corn product \$37 was in the stalks and \$63 in he ears. It may be well to bear this in mind the present season and see if some practica means can not be put in action to save the means can not be put a stake in better shape. It is hard to see how they can make money by growing so many acres of corn that they must lose over one-third of its value in order to save two-thirds. Less acres and more thorough work will olve the problem.



The breeders are now overstocked with birds, and are anxious to reduce them. They usually retain the young stock until fully matured, so as to select their prize-winning males and females. When this is done the surplus is sold. This surplus may really be the best of the flocks, as breeders select more for a few useless points than for vigor or utility, and those who buy now will be able to get better stock than by waiting until spring. It is not easy to procure hens or pullets of the pure breed in the spring without paying a greater sum than many are willing to give, but at this season prices are within the reach of all. If pullets are not desired, the object should be to secure a male or two, in order to grade up the common flocks. If this is done, the improvement will be so satisfactory as to impress the importance of the use of pure breeds antirely.
