#### THE GREAT BOOTH.

Short Sketch of the Man Who Will Arrive in London Tomorrow.

Sixty-Five Years of Age-His Humble Beginning-Great Work Done by the Army.

The famous Gen. Booth, founder of The famous Gen. Booth, founder of the Salvation Army, author of the remarkable book, "In Darkest England," and originator of the scheme for the alleviation of the "submerged tenth," will arrive in this city at 5:40 o'clock tomorrow evening and will be welcomed at the G. T. R. station by Salvationists and prominent citizens. He will address the men's meeting in the Grand Opera House on Sunday afternoon and Opera House on Sunday afternoon and evening, and will expound the subject, "Darkest England and the Way Out,"
at the Queen's Avenue Methodist
Church Monday night.

William Booth was born in Notting-ham, Eng., April 10th, 1829. His mother was a most saintly character, and no doubt to her influence and training must be attributed his earliest religious im-

Until the age of fifteen, however, he was unconverted. Happening one day to stray into a Wesleyan chapel, his attention was arrested by the novelty and simplicity of their service. For some time he continued to attend. The truths, powerfully expounded, took an increasing hold of his mind, and on one memorable evening, after days and nights of anxious seeking, he publicly and un-

reservedly gave his heart to God. During these early days he was an in-defatigable worker. Unable to leave business until 8 o'clock, he would hurry away to hold cottage meetings, which often lasted till 10, and were succeeded by visits to the sick and dying. When only seventeen he was promoted to be a local preacher, and two years later his superintendent urged him to offer himself for the ministry. But ill-health prevented him for some time from tak-

ing this step.
In 1849 he removed to London, where he still continued his aggressive Christian work. This was the first separation from his idolized mother, and he felt the parting most keenly. In 1851 a vio-lent controversy arose between the Wesleyan Society and what was then called the Reform movement. Although taking no active part in this controversy, it ultimately led him to sever his connection with the former and cast in his lot with the Reformers, who most enthysics teally redocted. who most enthusiastically welcomed him into their midst. He was after a little while, relieved from circuit duty and set apart as an evangelist. Remarkable results attended his labors. Hundreds of people were convicted of sin and sought salvation, while earnest appeals for his services came pouring

in from all over the country.

Shortly after this an event took place which had much to do with the moulding of his life and the fashioning of his character. He met Miss Catharine Mumford, who a few years afterward became Mrs. William Booth, and whose sacred memory will ever live in the minds of thousands who rise up to call the "Mother of the Salvation Army"

After pending some years in evangelistic work, and seeing many thousands of conversions, his reappointment as an evangelist was refused, whereupon he resigned his position, left home and friends, and, with a delicate wife and four little children, care and training of home. London of-fered great scope for work, and in 1864 they moved there, taking a house

at Hammersmith. On Mile End Waste the first Salvation Army meeting was held, which was followed by a procession to a large tent, in which Mr. Booth was then holding services. Little by little the way was opened up, and without any definite plan the soul-saving work was carried on with marked success, until necessity demanded some organization, and Mr. William Booth and his little band of workers came to be known as the "Christian Mission." But the little seedling continued to grow, until in 1878 the first War Congress was held, and the Christian Mission passed out of existence, and gave place to the ever-extending Salvation Army.

A glance at some of the statistics given at the recent International Congress, held in London, Eng., which not only celebrated the 29th anniversary of the Salvation Army, but also kept in memory the 65th birthday of the worldbeloved Gen. Booth, suffice to convince even the most prejudiced mind of the success of this divinely organized movement. There are at present over 11,000 offi-

cers and 1,990 corps. The army is today carrying on operations in 37 different

countries and colonies, while others are

shortly to be bombarded. One demonstration in London boasted of a march so long that it took two hours to pass a given point. Gen. Booth, as a preacher of the Gospel, is uncared for, by many, but Gen. Booth, as the author of "Darkest England," as the friend of the down-trodden and oppressed, is a different person-age. He is warmly applauded and eagerly sought after. The awful picture of the sin and wretchedness of London presented itself to the eye of this large-souled man, and the result was "Dark-est England and the Way Out," a book that was read by high and low, rich and poor, and whose schemes are being sucpoor, and whose schemes are being suc-cessfully carried out. The social work, comprising shelter, prison gate and res-cue homes, labor bureaus, salvation workshops, social farms, etc., is spreading, not over London alone but throughout the world. The general figures are: Slum posts, 176; rescue homes, 306; food depots, 21; shelters, 33; farm colonies, 6; total nightly accommodation for the homeless, 4,850.

BRITAIN'S BEST DAYS.

Dr. Montague agreed with Mr. Laurier that Canada should look to England for its example, but asked what that example was. Dr. Montague declared that England's greatness began with a defensive tariff, in 1337, when fines and even death was inflicted upon anyone who wore foreign clothes. Mr. Laurier and the Liberal party take their inspiration from the last half-century, in which England has been extending her trade and commerce with all the nations of the world, and has been in the vanguard of all that is great, all that is noble, and all that is good. (Cheers,) That is from whence Mr. Laurier draws his inspiration. Can you, young men, not drink at the same fountain and be satisfied? Let the young man who interrupted me turn back to the light that shines from the inspiration of the Conservative party, which turns back, and back, and back, groping and groping, till, finally, they come to the year 1337—(great laughter)—and reaching that they plant themselves down beside a statute that enacted fine and warning, and imprisonment and death if you were a stitch of clothing that, was not made in our own country. I thank Dr. Montague for that, and I hasten to do him the favor he asked from his audience, to remember, and to ask you to remember, the date, 1337. (Laughter.) That is the inspiration of the high tax party; that is where they go to get it.—[Mr. Paterson, M.P. for Brant, at Montreal.

Parnell (secretary protem.), Ald. O'Meara, Ald. J. W. Jones, Ald. Wm. Heaman, Ald. Carrothers, Mr. F. E. Leonard and Mr. Wm.

Bowman. The meeting was called to consider a communication from the auditors, Messrs. Jewell and Cottrell, in reference to certain moneys paid to the directors of the late board, which they considered were ir-

regular. Of course the payment referred to is the \$900 granted to themselves by the director

Mr. Wm. Bowman moved, seconded by Ald. Jones, that an itemized statement of the expenses of the late board for the past year be prepared by the auditors, stating what exception they take to any expenditure, if any, and that the same be prepared by the city treasurer and referred to the board's solicitors to ascertain whether

they are legal or not. The motion carried. Ald. Jones remarked significantly that though the old board would not find money to pay the laboring men on the road who received no wages, it found a nice sum for

itself. Ald. O'Meara asked if the old board had power to confirm its own minutes. Was not it in the power of the new board? Mr. Bowman-It usually rests with the new board.

This will be ascertained later on. Ald. Parnell said there should be some safe place for the valuable papers of the board. He wished to be relieved of the responsibility of caring for them. Mr. Leonard thought a permanent secre-

tary should be appointed—one who would always be on hand. The books should be kept in the one building. Ald. Carrothers suggested City Clerk Kingston as secretary. This matter will be dealt with at a fuller meeting of the board. In the meantime Ald. Parnell con-

The little family was by this time growing up, and demanded the sion on South street was started by a number of prominent members of the Dundes S reet Center Methodist Church, which is a mistake on the part of your reporter.
About eight years ago Messrs, Robert
Nisbet and Thos. Hockie, two young men who were members of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church, first started the South Street Mission on the sight which it has occupied until the present time. These young men conducted the work there for about a year, when they handed the man-agement of it over to the church of which they were members. A committee from that church then conducted the mission for about four years, the scholars increasing in numbers to such an extent that it was found necessary to increase the size of the place to its present dimensions. About that time a disagreement arose between the Baptists and Methodists (of whom there was quite a number) as to the ownership of the mission, and the Methodists withdrew and moved on to Hill street. Later on the Baptists moved east on to Egerton street, where they have succeeded in building up a very fine mission, with an average attendance of ahout 125 scholars. The Methodist Council of the city came to the assistance of the seceders, and they resumed their old quarters on South street, under the name of the "South Street Methodist Mission." The mission was given in charge of Dundas Street Center Methodist Church, and Mr. F. W. Birks was appointed superintendent, which position he held until last year, when he was succeeded by Mr. J. H. Dixon. It is not my desire to belittle in the least the good work done by the Methodist friends on South street, and I have only written this explanation in justice to those who worked so hard for the mission's advancement when it was first
